NEW YEAR BEGINNINGS

At the beginning of 2018, the children have been thinking about the 'Next Steps' in their learning by writing a 'Resolution' for our Next Steps Tree Display. They have been incredibly honest and we look forward to the pleasure of teaching them how to accomplish their goals! The Topics studied in each of the classes this term are:



ST KEW NATURE CLUB



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ST. KEW FARMSHOP & CAFÉ RE-OPENS FOR BUSINESS.

This December St. Kew Farmshop & Café, which is situated next to St. Kew Golf course on the A39, re-opened under new management.

Both the new managers are from farming families: Sarah Reskelly is local from Chapel Amble, and her partner, Josh Robinson, is from Somerset. Together they are aiming to provide quality farm-fresh local produce. Therefore currently they are sourcing cheeses from Amble Creamery, breads from Da Bara Bakery in Grampound Road, meats from Kittos of Par, and coffees and teas and soft drinks from speciality Cornish supplier in Falmouth and Penzance along with local suppliers of seasonal vegetables. The décor is pleasantly contemporary in greys and pale blues, and the light and airy deli-café uses the same local produce to provide a range of made-tomeasure sandwiches and delicious snacks – and Josh, who is a specialist pizza-maker, is using the purpose-built wood-fired oven to create a range of pizzas to suit all tastes.

They are open daily:

Monday - Saturday from 9am - 5pm, and 9.30am - 4.30pm on Sundays. Plus late night Friday evening opening from 6.30pm - 9pm.

The business is not currently licensed, but customers may 'bring your own bottle'.

Please can you help

I am trying to help an Italian man find his family here in Cornwall, as I have been touched by his story told by his friend who travelled over from Italy to try and find information for him.

His father, Antonio Guarini, was a POW in WW2 and was sent to Cornwall to work on farms around the Delabole & St. Teath area in June 1944. Antonio has since died in Italy and apparently he never forgot his family here in Cornwall and constantly talked about his twin sons.

He wanted his son, Franco, to find the two sons he had to leave behind when he returned to Italy in October 1946. The Government wouldn't allow him to return to England as he had refused to work in a munitions factory. The twin boys would have been born between April 1945 and October 1946.

Antonio and another prisoner, Francesco Sirago, lived and worked on a farm with a family in Delabole who consisted of the mother and father and twin

The View from the Allotments

..... and a view is all it is at the moment, since very few of us have managed to do any meaningful work on the gardens over the past few weeks.

I would say that normally by this stage of the year, we would at least have turned over parts of the plots and dug in some manure but to be honest, the weather has been so depressing and the ground so heavy after all the rain that it doesn't really seem worth taking the fork out of the shed. Not to mention the 'orrible flu which has hit so many of us during the past two or three weeks, and saps all energy. Anyway, that's my excuse.

I do intend, however, to write a few paragraphs each month to let you know how our community gardens are doing and even though they're not doing much at the moment, there certainly will be some activity soon.

In the meantime, we are busily eating the produce we worked so hard to seed and plant and weed during the latter half of 2017. We personally will be eating purple sprouting broccoli, sprouts, cavolo nero (posh cabbage), massive leeks and huge parsnips, and I expect these to keep us going until April, as has been the case in previous years. And I am delighted to report that the asparagus which we planted over two years ago seems to have bedded in well and I am promising myself some tender bundles to have with some smoked salmon in May. But I really must go and weed their beds again, just to encourage them.....

Last year we had our first 'best-kept plot' competition, with a cup and prizes handed out at our AGM. Our Judge, Jim Godden, was not looking for an immaculately tidy plot (just as well!) but rather searching for one which had clearly BEEN cropping for some time, WAS currently producing vegetables and fruit, and showed much promise of things TO COME. He felt that a good many of our plots were producing well and making good use of this community facility. Let's hope we can impress him again this year.

If anyone is interested in joining the association, we currently have four plots vacant at an annual fee of ± 38 .

This fee includes free water from three standpipes, free manure delivered two or three times a year, and the use of the communal shed. All for $\pounds 38$ – not bad, eh?



Views from our local MP Scott Mann

I greatly welcome the Prime Minister's recent speech where she outlined the Government's commitment to protecting the environment and clamping down on plastic waste.

Launching the Government's new Environment Plan, Theresa May highlighted our steps for a cleaner, greener Britain that will leave our environment in a better state than we found it for the next generation.

This includes a pledge to eliminate all avoidable plastic waste, encouraging supermarkets to introduce plastic-free aisles, extending the 5p charge for plastic bags to all retailers and issuing a consultation on taxing the most environmentally damaging plastics.

To date, we have used nine billion fewer plastic bags as a consequence of introducing the 5p charge. This has led to a reduction of 83 per cent and £95 million has been donated to environmental educational, and other good causes.

The Government has also launched a public consultation on introducing a bottle deposit return scheme which could significantly increase the amount that we recycle. A system already exists in Germany whereby customers get money or vouchers when returning plastic bottles, which means that they save money on their next shop as well as helping to protect the environment.

It is our duty to leave our planet in a better state for the next generation, with cleaner air, stronger protections for animal welfare and greener spaces. Readers will no doubt be aware of the challenges facing the NHS this winter, which has seen longer waits at A&E and wards filling up with people suffering from winter illnesses.

In the lead up to this winter, the Government allocated an additional £100 million to A&Es across England, including £1.6m for the Royal Cornwall Hospitals Trust, £2.4m for Plymouth Hospitals Trust and over £800,000 for North Devon.

It is inevitable that during the winter the NHS faces extra pressure, however, after a recent meeting with NHS Kernow, I was told that one-third of people who turn up at A&E don't need to be there and should be going to minor injury units or GPs, and we need to get better at signposting people to the best place for their treatment.

Readers may also have seen recent reports that ten Minor Injury Units were likely to close in Cornwall, including three in North Cornwall. These reports, which were false and politicised, caused great concern amongst people in Cornwall, and NHS Kernow have assured me in person that there are no plans to close MIUs.

A much-needed review is currently underway into the county's health and social care systems, and this includes looking at how best to deliver local NHS services while integrating health and social care to make sure that people can be cared for in their communities instead of in hospital. The review is being undertaken by NHS Kernow, Cornwall Council and other parties, and the people of North Cornwall can be confident that I will hold these organisations to account and that I want an NHS which delivers high quality local services to everyone.

GILL'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

It is real 'Irish Stew with Crusted Dumplings' weather so here we go:

Irish Stew with Crusted Dumplings

For the stew:

- 3lb (1.35 kg) neck fillets of lamb and best end of neck cutlets mixed
- 2 tablespoons seasoned plain flour
- 12oz (350g) onions, thickly sliced
- 8 oz (225g) carrots cut into chunks
- 2 medium leeks washed and sliced
- 1 large potato, peeled and cut into chunks
- 1 rounded tablespoon pearl barley
- Salt and pepper

For the dumplings:

- 6 oz (175g) self raising flour
- 3 tablespoon chopped parsley
- 3 oz (90g) shredded suet
- $\circ~$ Salt and pepper

Chopped fresh parsley to garnish.

You will need a 6 pint casserole dish.

Method

- Dry the fillets, trim any excess fat and cut into 4cm rounds. Dip them along with cutlets in the flour.
- Arrange layer of meat on base of the casserole followed by layer of onion, carrot, leek and potatoes. Season and continue layering until everything is in.
- Sprinkle in the pearl barley and pour in approximately 2 pints water and bring to the boil. Cover and simmer for 2 hours.
- About 15 minutes before the end of cooking time mix the flour and parsley with a seasoning of salt and pepper. Add sufficient cold water to make a stiff dough. Knead it lightly and shape into 12 dumplings.
- When the stew is ready, place the dumplings all over the surface, transfer the casserole to the highest shelf in the oven at 180c and leave for about 30 minutes until the dumplings are golden brown and crusty. Serve the meat surrounding the vegetables and dumplings with some of the gravy poured over.
- Sprinkle with chopped parsley and serve the rest of the gravy in a gravy boat.

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



ANNIVERSARY OF THE FIRST WORLD WAR (LEST WE FORGET)

January – February 1918

From the Parish Magazine

The Reverend H Dalton Jackson writes. "The year 1917, with all its hopes and possibilities, has gone. As we look back we realise what momentous happenings have taken place, both at home and on the battlefields of this world-wide war. Sorrow has crushed many; the hand of death has pressed heavily upon many houses in this parish. Yet, through it all, I trust we have realised something of the presence of our Saviour.

As we look forward into the unknown future let us remember the reassuring and comforting promise, "I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee." The future we do not know; but the promise we DO. The wish uppermost in the minds and hearts of all is that a victorious peace may be ours, and that the stricken world may know something of the peace and brotherhood of man."

Home Front



Rationing. Although any area in the country that could grow food was converted to allotments, and livestock were kept in people's back gardens, malnutrition was returning to poor areas. The average weekly consumption of sugar and meat halved. Despite a policy of maximising food production (the wheat harvest of 1917 was the highest ever recorded), some commodities,

such as potatoes, were often in short-supply. In late

1917, a fear spread that the nation was running out of food. Panic buying led to shortages and, in January 1918, the Ministry of Food decided to introduce ration cards and everyone had to register with a butcher and grocer. Rationing started with sugar, meat, butter, cheese and margarine.

Western Front



Rations for the troops on the western front were something else! The static nature of the Western Front made it easy for the delivery of food to the men through a complex system of trains, motor vehicles, horse-drawn limbers and hand-carts.

Space in the supply lines was always at a premium, so compact, calorifically dense food with a long shelf-life suited the army best. Tinned bully beef was easier to store, transport and serve than fresh or frozen meat, and hardtack biscuit was preferable to bread. The rock-hard biscuit meant that even men with good teeth found it a challenge. The biscuit made better kindling than eating, and the meat was likened to mule. In fact, mule or horse meat did unofficially find its way into the rations, as many units ate the animal casualties of shelling rather than waste the meat.

Reflection

When does winter end and spring start? Do you go by the meteorologists or the sun? So, is it March 1st or 21st? Or by the climate, and how many daisies there are on the lawn? So, whenever spring arrives or has arrived, whether you have spring cleaned the house and tidied up the garden or not, take time out to look at your life whatever season it is in. Rejoice in the good, reflect on the bad, see what must be thrown out, what must be cleaned and polished. Enjoy the new growth in the garden of your life and the lengthening days.

Come & join us for some breakfast fellowship in the Parish hall behind St. Kew Church, every Wednesday at 9am or whatever time you drop the kids off at school.


Free tea/coffee and toast with toppings, and a great opportunity to have a natter & catch up with some old friends & meet some new ones. Play area for kids.

weighing just eight stone, needing extensive treatment between 1947 and 1950 - a period when he nearly died. This put Fred off travelling away from Cornwall for the rest of his life, only occasionally crossing the Tamar into Devon.

In 1952, he started his taxi firm, operating from St. Kew Highway, alongside keeping chickens and pigs. His first car was an Austin 12, followed by Morris Oxfords and an Austin Cambridge. The director of Ford UK wrote a personal letter to him after Fred appeared in the local papers singing the praises of his 10 year old Ford Orion, which was still going well after 360,000 miles.

Fred worked full time until he was 73, but kept driving part-time until he was 88. He was a very courteous and careful driver, and took pride in keeping his cars impeccably clean.

Fred met Sybil Rush of St Teath in 1958 through chapel meetings, and they married on February 29 1964.

In 1962, Fred bought an orchard in the village where he and Sybil oversaw the building of their home, a bungalow named Polmarick, where they brought up their only child, Susan, born in 1968. When Sue married Steve Hambly in 1991 Fred would travel weekly up to her home in Saltash.

In recent weeks, Fred was driven around some of his old haunts, the cottage at Pendoggett and the quarry by his cousin Ken Finnemore, and chuckle at how the quarry now hosts luxury tepee holidays. Fred had a fantastic day with his family on Christmas Day before he was taken into hospital, showing that, until the end, he lived life to the full.

He leaves a widow, Sybil, daughter Susan, grandchildren Ellen and James, and two sisters.

The celebration, followed by burial at Chapel Amble cemetery, was conducted by the Rev Alistair Sharp. Singing was led by The Shipwrecks Choir, the organist was John Godwin, and the eulogy was given by John Bennallick. Bearers were David Armstrong, Ian Gillbard, David Hambly, James Hambly, Paul Harris and Martin Langdon.

A celebration of the life of a man well known to thousands of customers and friends after running a taxi business in North Cornwall for over 60 years has taken place at Rock Methodist Church.

Fred Crahart, who died aged 92, was born in the family cottage at Pendoggett, the eldest of four, but lived most of his life at St Kew Highway. Water for the cottage had to be fetched from a nearby well, and he had to walk nearly two miles each way to school.

He helped his Dad and Granddad working on farms from around the age of 10, learning how to drive lorries for short distances. This started as soon as he was tall enough for his feet to reach the pedals, and allowed the others to keep working without stopping. Fred never actually took a driving test, despite driving for so many years and hundreds of thousands of miles – he obtained his licence before the test became a requirement. Leaving school at 14, he went to work on a farm for 10 shillings a week, then to Tregildren Quarry, Trelill, for 14 shillings, where he worked with his father.

At 18 he was conscripted into the Army during the Second World War. After training in Ireland he was deployed to the Far East, travelling in a troop ship (which he hated), and spending time in India, Sumatra and Hong Kong. He came back to the UK very poorly with tuberculosis and

Growing up in the 1920s

Last night I was reminiscing about my life as a young child in the nineteen twenties and was struck by the large change in the pace of life between then and now.

Our day would start with the arrival of the milkman in his pony cart with a milk churn on the back. We would go out with our largest jugs which he would fill with milk from the churn, using a long handled ladle. Once a week our next caller would be the 'Dust Cart' with the dustmen to empty our dustbins of rubbish. This was a large wagon drawn by two beautiful Suffolk Punch horses. They usually arrived at about midday and took their lunch break outside our house. They were given their lunch in two large nosebags slipped around their necks. This gave us children the chance to go out and stroke their lovely golden coats.

In the afternoon we might be visited by an organ grinder (no he didn't have a monkey but I'm told some did!). He would push his organ (which was like a huge musical box) to the side of the road and play music by turning a handle on the side. We would be given coins to put in his cap, which he'd placed on the pavement to receive contributions. Late in the day we would see the lamplighter arrive on his bicycle, clutching a long pole. He would prop his bike against the lamppost and with his long pole reach up and switch on the gas supply to the lamp and produce a spark to ignite it.



A friend of mine tells me that the arrival of the lamplighter in her road was a signal to the children playing outside that it was time to return home.

Finally at the end of the day those arriving at the railway station would hire a cab - horse drawn of course!

Historic village trough returned to Pendoggett

The Pendoggett community braved a cold Saturday morning to come together as one to commemorate the return of their historic village blacksmith forge trough.

The noteworthy 15th century Cornish trough was used by successive generations of the Finnemore and Thyer families who operated the village blacksmith's forge throughout the 19th and early 20th centuries. After the forge's closure and conversion into a shop in the late 1940s, the trough was moved across the road to the Cornish Arms and placed on behalf of the community into the safekeeping of successive pub landlords where it remained a popular village feature until its sudden removal from Pendoggett in mid-2017.

Five-year old Locryn Finnemore, youngest grandson of David and Fran Finnemore, and the direct descendent of the blacksmith's family, cut the celebratory ribbon on behalf of his family, watched by proud great-aunt Heather Harris. Locryn's father, Ben, informed the assembled well-wishers that his relatives in Australia were delighted to learn of its return. Local historian William Garland, who has written an interesting book on the history of the Thyer family, spoke about their role in the local community. Guest of honour was Port Isaac resident Terry Gifford who, as the oldest living person to be born in Pendoggett and who worked in the village for most of his life, kindly shared his memories of the sadly bygone colourful pub characters who often lent against the trough outside the Cornish Arms waiting for the doors to open again!

Firmly secured in its new position, the village looks forward to future generations admiring its history. As the Cornish trough might say "we have seen 'em come and seen 'em go, but I am back to stay!"

A member of the public enquired what was happening with the Post Office situation at St Kew Highway. The Council had not heard anything of late and would write to find the latest situation.

Please note ~ since the meeting we have heard that the Post Office is providing a mobile Post Office service commencing the 19^{th} of March. This will call at St Kew Highway on Mondays and Thursdays at 13.00 to 15.00. It will also be at Port Isaac at the overspill car park on Wednesdays at 12.30 to 13.30.

With regard to the company that enquired about a possible interest in affordable housing at St Kew Highway, the Council has had no further contact.

We have had a couple of complaints regarding the 'no parking on grass' signs on Common Land around the parish. They are there to protect the green areas for us all to enjoy. Over the whole of the UK approximately 8,000 acres of grass common has been lost in the past two years by the pressure of parking vehicles.

The Council keeps reporting pot holes, but recently the reply back from Cornwall Council is that they are not all pot holes as they are not deep enough!!

The View from the Allotments

..... and not much has changed since I wrote a month ago.

I have only seen one person round at the site in the past few weeks, which I suppose is an indication of how inviting the idea of gardening is at the moment! I do go there on a regular basis to get produce for ourselves and for friends, and when I lifted three leeks last week they came up with such enormous clods of earth it was difficult to carry them. That means, of course, that digging is virtually out of the question – even with an efficient motivator you wouldn't make much headway. In the meantime though, all our seeds have arrived and it is really annoying that we can't get going with anything. The only comfort is that we all seem to be in the same boat and I don't feel so guilty.

We did see another allotment recently which was clearly producing well. We were in Southern Spain for a (very cold) week and did a lot of walking and one day we stood on the roadside and watched two elderly chaps feeding a horde of cats in a garden way down the bank from the highway. We waited until the men staggered up the path, each carrying large bags of vegetables. We spoke to them for a while and admired the cats and told them about our own allotments back in Cornwall. We were envying their ability to work the ground at this stage of the year and they dug in to their bags and came out with seasonal gifts for us – radishes and an avocado pear – all ripe and ready to eat. How about that on a cold day in February?

I comfort myself with the fact that we are using our own vegetables all the time – parsnips, leeks, purple-sprouting broccoli and sprouts, all of which appeared on the table during the past seven days. So we must be doing something right, and of course our onions have been magnificent and I hope we have as good a crop this year. Tony buys a variety which doesn't "bolt" and last year's crop was terrific. I think I planted 160, of which only two or three failed. AND we got prizes for them at the Parish Show.

I am keeping my fingers crossed that by the time April's Magazine appears, I shall be able to boast about how much we have tilled, mulched, seeded and planted. Until then, keep calm, and hope the rain stops before the hosepipe ban takes effect.

Still got four vacant plots by the way, so do ask if you would like to see them.



GILL'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Haddock au Gratin

Ingredients

- 1-1/2 lb haddock
- Salt and pepper
- 1/4 lb button mushrooms

For the sauce:

- 1oz butter
- 1 rounded tablespoon flour
- ½ pt milk
- $\circ~$ Grated cheese, breadcrumbs and butter

Method

- Skin the fish and cut into portions, place at the bottom of a buttered dish and season.
- Chop the mushrooms and place on top of the fish.

For the sauce:

- Make a roux with the butter, flour and milk, and extra cheese if you want a cheesy sauce, season to taste.
- Pour the sauce over the fish.
- Mix some grated cheese with the breadcrumbs (melted in butter) and sprinkle over the sauce.
- The sauce should be thicker than normal to allow for the dilution of the juices.
- $\circ~$ Bake for 20-25 minutes at 350° F.

Other white fish such as cod or plaice can be used if preferred.

Mashed potato can be put on the top of the dish once cooked and placed under the grill to brown.

ANNIVERSARY OF THE FIRST WORLD WAR (LEST WE FORGET)

February - March 1918

Home Front.

After the introduction of compulsory food rationing, coal was the next commodity on which action was required in order to conserve supplies, so a 'Curfew Order' was announced: no lights could be used for illuminating shop windows; no food to be cooked in any hotel, club, inn, restaurant or boarding house between 9.30pm and 5.00am; all lights in the dining room of these places must be put out at 10.00pm; no performances in theatres, music-halls, cinemas or other places of amusement shall be continued after 10.30pm.

Western Front

During the period 21st March – 5 April, the Germans attempted to win the war with their Spring Offensive, by a series of operations in Flanders. Reinforced with 500,000 troops from the Eastern Front, they made strong breakthroughs using gas, artillery, air power, and shock troops to bypass defensive positions in foggy conditions that hampered the defenders. 21,000 British prisoners were taken. French reinforcements were rushed in, while tired and hungry German troops slowed having driven well ahead of their supply lines, and sustained losses of over a quarter of a million casualties, so the offensive was halted.

We Will Remember Them

During the German advance, Private Reginald Harris was killed on 24th March 1918, aged 23. He was serving with the 7th Battalion of the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry. He was the son of Daniel and Ellen Mabel (formerly Hawken) who farmed, on own



account, at Tregeare, Pendoggett.

Reginald is commemorated on the Pozieres Memorial in Picardie, France.

First All-Metal Plane Developed

The German Hugo Junkers, Professor of Mechanics, designed the world's first all-metal plane in 1915 and the prototype was built in 1917 and began full production in 1918. It was made from a lightweight form of aluminium called duralumin. He also provided the Junkers CL-1, the best German ground attack plane of the war. After the Armistice Junkers established his own company - Lufthansa.

during the war.

The first pilotless drone was designed for the US Navy in 1916 and developed by two inventors, Elmer Sperry and Peter Hewitt, as an unmanned aerial bomb. Measuring less than 19 feet across with a 12 horse-power motor, it weighed 175lbs and was stabilised and directed with gyroscopes and a barometer to determine altitude. The first flight in history occurred on Long Island on 6th March 1918. In the end, its targeting technique, 'point and fly', was too imprecise for it to be useful against ships

Plastics in the sea have been highlighted lately by programmes like Blue Planet 2, and we often hear of community litter-picks on beaches; but our green environment is often forgotten (not overlooking that wind and rainfall & streams can carry this rubbish into the sea!)

When I was a child there was a TV advert featuring a cartoon couple which made littering the countryside almost anti-social; for an area that relies on tourism and farming a return to this mind-set would surely be ideal? Perhaps we could lead the way...














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Letter to the Magazine

The Blacksmith's Trough of Pendoggett.

Reference the historically interesting well-written piece by Patrick Mewton in last month's edition, "Historic Village trough returned to Pendoggett". Attached is a photograph of the trough – bottom right in the photograph – when it was in use by George Henry Thyer when he became the village smithy in 1912.

Patrick Mewton, whose family has long connections with Pendoggett, is to be congratulated, together with the other community-minded individuals, on the detective work and persistence in ensuring the trough was returned to where it belongs in Pendoggett.

Not only did he organise the celebration he also got relatives to attend (some are now living in the village) of another Pendoggett smithy James Henry Finnemore.

The original picture is held by Kim Appleby, Archivist of the St Kew History Society. In 1912 the Thyer family were living at "Lydcott", opposite the Cornish Arms, with the forge and the trough, to the left of the house, now modern homes. Wouldn't it be wonderful if the History Society received more snippets of information, which, through modern technology, can be researched and thus open up the past for the enjoyment of us all. The View from the Allotments

..... getting boring, isn't it?

I wish I could point to great swathes of land under cultivation and seedlings coming up all over the place but I can't. I don't know how other allotment sites are faring, but this winter's weather seems to have disheartened us all. Every time we have one dry day and think "tomorrow I might tackle the", the next day it's pouring with rain again and all hope of digging or rotavating is gone.

Actually we did make a start about ten days ago and went at it with a will, lifting all the old

brassicas, the (very heavy and awkward) maize plants and putting the parsnips into a sort of clamp for storage. We fully intended going round again the next day to carry on the good work, but no luck. Rain again.

We did a little wander round the site yesterday (no rain!) to see that several of our members have actually started to turn over their plots and make use of the excellent manure that we buy from Graham Tiplady. I noticed that a couple of plots have clearly been put under potatoes, as

Bring back the crib bag! (update from a litter-picker)



I'm delighted that the Parish Council is considering an organised litter-pick, and hope as many people get involved (one way or another) as possible.

Perhaps it could count towards volunteering (Duke of Edinburgh participants), community projects (parish organisations – do we have any Brownies or Scouts?), or the lone dog walker that would like to enjoy a plastic-free countryside. If none of these tick your boxes, perhaps a greater commitment to always binning your rubbish; and expecting family/friends to do the same might be your thing. Did you know it takes 12 years for a cigarette butt to disintegrate, and 450 years for a plastic bottle!

One thing I've noticed since litter-picking my local stretch of road is that I have a far greater sense of pride in keeping it litter-free. It doesn't take much effort to stop the car (in a safe spot) or pause on a dog walk, to pick up a lone crisp packet (now known you can see the mounding up of the rows. Apart from that not much is going on.

We had a check on the greenhouse, which has stood up well to the winds and have decided that weather or no, now is the time to put some seeds in trays and start thinking ahead to the planting.

Tony is getting some special covered seed trays which work without constant watering, which means that we can leave them on their own from time to time. Of course, since the greenhouse is DRY we can get on with that, weather or no. In the meantime we have received our onion sets through the post and I am aiming to get them in well before the end of the month. So we shall have to have at least one small section rotavated and raked over in the next ten days or so, even if we get soaked in the process.

I really hope I can write in a month's time of hard work and RESULTS – keep fingers crossed!

There are still four vacant plots by the way, so do ask if you would like to see them. We plan to have them rotavated too, so they are a much more attractive proposition for prospective tenants. Do please get in touch.

as pick-it-up-yoga!) This also discourages more litter being flung out of other passing vehicles – somehow rubbish breeds more rubbish: if people see litter on the road they seem to think it absolves them of responsibility for their own litter-louting.

The vast majority of 'fresh litter' I've collected is lunch-on-the-go items (drink cans/bottles, branded coffee cups, crisp and sweet wrappers along with occasional sandwich/pasty/chip bags). I reckon these things have been picked up en-route during the working day, and tossed out of the vehicle window as convenience food is consumed. Works traffic passing through the parish obviously rate the state of their car interior over the countryside, how we educate them I'm unsure. I'm tempted to start a 'bring back the crib bag' campaign so everyone takes their lunch-litter home!



GILL'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Three Onion Soup serves 4

Ingredients

- 4 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- 750g red onions, finely sliced
- 340g shallots, finely sliced
- 6 spring onions, chopped
- 3 teaspoons plain flour
- 2 teaspoons mustard powder
- 1.2 litres chicken stock
- 4 sprigs of thyme
- 3 tablespoons Greek natural yoghurt

Method

- Heat the oil in a saucepan, and fry the red onions and shallots for 20 - 30 minutes stirring frequently until golden and caramelised.
- Stir in the flour and mustard, and cook gently for 2 minutes.

- Add the stock and the thyme, and bring to the boil, stirring well.
- Cover and simmer for 30 minutes. Remove from the heat and remove the thyme sprigs.
- Season to taste, and stir in the yoghurt.
- Pour the soup into warmed bowls and scatter with the chopped spring onions.
- Serve with chunks of good crusty bread.





ANNIVERSARY OF THE FIRST WORLD WAR (LEST WE FORGET)

March/ April 1918

From The Parish Magazine.

Extract from the Vicar's entry - "... Notwithstanding the severe weather of Easter Day, both our 7 and 8 o'clock celebrations of the Holy Communion (when we especially remembered our absent soldier boys) were well attended, some coming several miles in the wet to make their communion... At this supremely critical moment in the history of our Empire, when the future of humanity hangs in the balance, when our heroic men are courageously holding the line of defence against fearful odds, when thousands are making the great sacrifice, - let us daily beseech the Lord of Hosts to have mercy upon us, and to stretch forth His Arm to help and defend us... The whole day, with its recollections and bright services, brought us very near to those we are thinking much of at the present moment, and made us feel in God's good time the agony of the world's calvary will be followed by the exultant joy of the children of God because of the overthrow of the powers of evil, and the final triumphant purposes of God."

"Easter Vestry Meeting. – Owing to the Vicar, as a member of the V.T.C. [Voluntary Training Corps] being on parade for General Inspection on Easter Monday, the Vestry Meeting is postponed till Friday, 5th inst., at 7.30, when our report and financial statement will be presented."

"*Our Day School Children* have knitted several pairs of Navy blue socks for Mrs Jackson, who sends them on to Mrs Roy Jackson for distribution to our wounded sailors. The children's work, under Miss Mehennick, is much appreciated."

"A Lecture in the Institute [Every Institute, now a private house] on "War-time and Domestic Cooking" was given by Miss Reece. There was quite a large number present, and some valuable hints and receipts were carried away by those present."

Home Front

Despite the imposition of rationing on the nation, it was reported in the national press that, because the throwing of rice at weddings was not banned, there were reports that groups of youths were going round the churchyards picking up individual grains of rice to feed their chickens.

The British dealt with the rationing with humour. A typical joke was: When the charlady turned up to do her half day, the mistress was a little disconcerted by her smile of welcome. "Why Eliza", she said, "What have you done with your teeth?" "Well, mum", replied the charlady, "We ain't goin' to 'ave anyfin' to chew until the war's over, so I've pawned 'em."

Rationing in Germany was also a problem for the Germans. It is said their system for controlling the food distribution was flawed. Everyone was issued with tickets, but the wealthy bought up supplies on the black market, leaving the poor with nothing but tickets.

Western Front

In their second major offensive, the Germans drove for Ypres and the chance to reach the important channel ports. Depleted British units which had been involved in the fighting the previous month, were stationed on what was seen as a 'quiet sector'. However, understrength Portuguese troops, who were in the line, suffered heavy casualties when the Germans broke through; therefore, Allied reserves were hastily moved to stem the tide. Since the French did not have any spare troops to send to the British Expeditionary Forces they were on their own. With the Allies under severe threat by the onslaught, the British Commander General Douglas Haig issued a famous order of 11th April: "There is no other course open to us but to fight it out. Every position must be held to the last man; there must be no retirement. With our backs to the wall and believing in the justice of our course each one of us must fight on to the end." On 24th April the very first tank versus tank battle took place when three British tanks faced three German tanks. The British were victors in this historic engagement. The defence against the German offensive, proved resolute and German commanders called off their offensive on 29th April. This was in part due to the bravery of American troops who fought alongside the British in the Battle of Lys. The American Expeditionary Force began to make a difference.

During the fighting, 58613 Driver WJ Penaligon of the Royal Field Artillery with the 39th Division Ammunition Column died 12th April 1918. He is commemorated at the Pozieres Memorial (Panel 7 to 10), in the Parish Church of St Breocke and Egloshayle, as well as on the War Memorials on Egloshayle Road and Coronation Park, Wadebridge, and in the publication "Wadebridge Casualties of The Great War" compiled by Ann Trebilcock. William John Penaligon is mentioned in the St Kew Parish Magazine as being listed at the Thanksgiving Service at St James Church in 1918. His father was William Penaligon, born at Egloshayle in 1865 and was a Quarryman; his mother Barbara was born at St Kew in 1864; they had 5 children: William, Edith, Nicholas, Charles and Alex. They were living at Trevilling Farm, Wadebridge, at the time of William's death.

William John Penaligon married Hilda Amy Long in 1916 and they had a daughter Dorothy; they were living at Pendoggett at the time of his death. Hilda was a sister to Private Douglas S Long (who died 7th March 1917) and is buried in St James Churchyard.

Easter Day this year falls on April 1st, April Fools' Day. Our God is a God of surprises so this is an opportunity to exploit not an embarrassment to hide! If you get caught out by someone's trick at Easter, don't repine but seize the moment to reflect upon the surprise. Jesus Christ is not always, if ever, what we expect. Even if we think we know what to expect – and Church people are particularly prone to thinking this – he has a habit of catching us unawares, choosing to come at unexpected moments, in the guise of unexpected people. So it as well to be prepared to find Christ in everyone and anyone, on any occasion. And to expect the unexpected, a call to follow Him.

St Paul thought that the message about Jesus which he preached was foolishness – certainly that it appears foolish to those who cannot or will not understand it. The foolishness of God does not really consist of tricks and surprises. Rather it is God's overwhelming generosity which appears foolish in human eyes. God's giving and giving, over and over again without stint, even to giving up his Son to die on a cross, seems foolish to us because we are always minded to consider the bottom line. Is it really worth it? Does it offer value-for-money? But such ways of thinking spring from the limitations of our minds. God's endless generosity is indeed challenged by human greed and want of regard for this, his earth, but it is not stifled by our incompetence or unwillingness to engage with him.

This Easter God offers again his love and blessing to all who have the will to accept what he comes to give.

The View from the Allotments

I was beginning to think that we should never have the chance to get digging or seeding or planting this year – or at least, not until mid-summer! But suddenly the site has begun to look a little more tended and cared-for and I am feeling altogether more positive.

We asked Graham Tiplady to bring his heavy-duty rotavator onto the site – it looks like a mini-tractor and makes short work of turning over heavy ground which has been left for some months, not to mention the weeds which have still been growing, despite frost and snow.

Anyway, we first wanted to turn over the four plots which are vacant, so that they would at least look a bit more inviting for anyone who wanted to take them over. We also offered the chance to tenants to have their own plots rotavated at the same time. It can be really hard work with the ground as waterladen it is and is a back-breaking job, even when one is young and fit (which a lot of us aren't!). We took the opportunity and Graham has cleared one of our two small plots. The other one we didn't want to touch as it has asparagus beds, strawberry plants and fruit bushes.

Obviously, it will need to be gone over again with a smaller machine and then raked over to produce what my father used to call a "fine tilth" and THEN I can put in my onions. We had such a brilliant crop





GILL'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Rogan Josh Pasta

A fast and fabulous version of the traditional Indian lamb stew.

Ingredients

- 250g dried or fresh Tagliatelle, kettle full of boiling water
- $\circ~$ Low fat cooking spray
- \circ 1 onion, finely chopped
- 400g lean lamb mince
- 2 tablespoons Rogan Josh curry paste
- o 300g passata
- o 175g cherry tomatoes halved
- 2 tablespoon fresh chopped coriander.

Method

 Put the tagliatelle into a saucepan and cover with boiling water, bring to the boil and simmer for 10 -12 minutes until al dente.

- Meanwhile, heat a lidded non-stick saucepan and spray with cooking fat. Cook the onion for 3 minutes or until beginning to soften.
- Add the lamb mince and curry paste and cook on high for 1 minute, stirring constantly.
- Stir in the passata and cherry tomatoes and bring to the boil. Cover and simmer gently for 5 minutes.
- Drain the pasta and add to the lamb sauce along with the coriander. Toss to coat and serve immediately.

Variation: Replace the lamb mince with vegetarian mince if preferred.

ANNIVERSARY OF THE FIRST WORLD WAR (LEST WE FORGET)

April/May 1918

Home Front

On 18 May, the British launched the first retaliatory air raid on German towns by bombing Cologne by day. The following day, the largest (and what would be the last) German night raid on London killed 49 and injured 177 civilians. The total number of civilian casualties from air raids since 1915, within the London Metropolitan Police District, was 668 killed and 1,938 injured. Londoners had every reason to believe they were on the front line.

On 19 May, the German also dropped bombs on British Camps and hospitals at Etaples with heavy casualties. Etaples was the location for a large (and infamous) training and rehabilitation depot in northern France.

Western Front

After the cessation of the recent German offensive on 30 April, four battle-weary British Divisions were 'resting', in a sector near the River Aisne, detached from the rest of the Army. They were recuperating but also guarding the trench line. On 25 May the French HQ reported that there were no indications of an enemy attack in the Aisne area. However, on the morning of 27 May 1918 the Germans began a bombardment and the British suffered heavy losses; this was followed by a poison gas drop. Once the gas had lifted, the Germans attacked. The Allies were taken by surprise and the Germans advanced through a 40-kilometre gap in the Allied lines.

During this period, the US Forces were ordered to take Cantigny on 28 May. This was the first offensive action of the war by the 28 Infantry Regiment (The Big Red One). They succeeded quite swiftly but lost 522 men killed or wounded. German coun-



ter attacks were ineffective. However, on 29 May the Germans launched a major offensive on the Aisne front. Soissons fell and the French government was preparing to flee Paris. Reserves from every quarter were rushed to the front to meet the threat. Included was the US 2 Division, which went into position north-west of Chateau Thierry near a patch of forest – Belleau Wood. More about Belleau Wood next month.

The Germans smashed through the Allied Divisions, capturing over 50,000 Allied soldiers by 30 May. It was here that the 2nd Battalion, the Devonshire Regiment (2 Devons), earned everlasting glory and a citation in the French Orders of the Day, by sacrificing themselves almost to a man in their stand.

It was during this Battle of Aisne, that 45606 Private Richard Henry Andrew of the 2 Devons was killed on 31 May 1918, aged 26. He is commemorated not only our War Memorial but also on the Soissons Memorial, located on the banks of the River Aisne. He was born at Chapel Amble in 1892, the son of William Willcocks Andrew and Thirza Ann Andrew (formerly Bassett) who was born at St Columb in 1850 and was buried at St James Churchyard on 11 January 1918. William, a highway labourer, born 1845, died at Hustyn Mill, St Breock on 11 February 1923. The father of William was John Andrew who married Jane Woolcock of Endellion, in St James Church, St Kew, on 22 July 1833 (both signed the register with "their mark"). John died 10 April 1870 at the Union Workhouse at Bodmin, and Jane died 16 August 1875 at Trequite, St Kew.

Richard Henry was brother to Susan, Richard, Mary, Jane, Elizabeth, John, Ada and William, and husband of Lilian Andrew (Kendall) whom he married on 25 July 1912, of Amble Street, St Kew (in the next house to Percy May who died on 8 August 1917). Lilian was born in 1890 and her father was Thomas, a farm labourer, and mother Mary Jane. She had a brother William, and sisters: Annie, Bessie and Marian – all the family were born at St Kew.

Richard Henry and Lilian had a son, Thomas, who was born 29 December 1912 and who married Marjorie Jan Power in 1938. Thomas and Marjorie had two girls: Valerie Ann, born 1943, and Lorna Joan, born 1945. A relative, David Andrews, a frequent visitor to this area, continues with the family history.

From Scott Mann MP

I was delighted to meet with Cornwall's Girl Guides last month during their annual celebration event at the Royal Cornwall Showground. The event highlighted the great achievements of the Girl Guides over the past 12 months and to commend those who help such a wonderful organisation. The Girl Guides do terrific work in bringing young people together to learn new skills and to socialise with others. Skills that are learnt through the Girl Guides as well as the Scouts, Cubs and Beavers can last with you forever, and it was great to meet with the Girl Guides and talk about what they've been learning and how they've helped their local communities.

The Showground also held a Farm and Country Day event the same week where schools came to learn about agriculture and country life.

This is a fantastic initiative which teaches children about where their food comes from and the benefits of good animal husbandry. Unfortunately there are a lot of scare stories in parts of the media which try to paint our agricultural sector in a bad light, and these events help to bust those myths by championing the high animal welfare standards that we have in the UK and how farmers look after their livestock.

The Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (DEFRA) just recently published its proposals for a post-Brexit agricultural policy, and I have spoken with the Environment Secretary to give my feedback. This includes encouraging farmers to engage with schools by holding educational visits and to have more of an input in managing public rights of way.

We have many paths around the countryside which need managing, and I think part of the future farming subsidy should include the upkeep of public rights of way so that people can enjoy the countryside, as well as farmers having the ability to move paths which hinder their farming.

The Government's proposals are open for public consultation and can be found on the DEFRA website.

DEFRA has also confirmed that it will be launching a bottle deposit return scheme to increase recycling rates and tackle plastic pollution, which I greatly welcome. Schemes like this already exist in Denmark, Sweden and Germany, where consumers are rewarded with cash or vouchers when returning plastic bottles or metal containers to local shops.

There is currently a big shift in attitudes towards plastic and the development of a scheme like this couldn't come at a better time. The UK is becoming more conscious about the effects of plastic waste, but there is more to do and I think deposit return schemes are a huge step in protecting the environment.

Here in the South West we all too often see the impact of plastic pollution on our beaches and in our seas, and I want to commend the hard work of campaign groups throughout the region who have been working to clean up their local areas and raise public awareness about plastic waste, including Bude Cleaner Seas and Surfers Against Sewage.

- They have scales all over their bodies and often have a layer of slime to help them glide through the water!


This was recorded for the History Society - our first living-history session. We hope for many more from our local friends before it's too late.

The View from the Allotments and gosh, wow, my word - what a difference a month makes!

I wasn't exactly despairing, but was getting a bit depressed at our lack of progress. We reckoned we were a good month behind and talking to fellow plotholders, that was the general opinion. But the past four weeks have seen several days of warm sunshine and only the occasional downpour, which means that the ground is drying out and we can actually produce whole patches which are ready for planting.

Tony has been growing broad beans in the greenhouse and we put them out a week ago to harden off and then I planted all 60 of them yesterday. Backbreaking, as I am not too good at kneeling, but it Will Be Worth It!

Last week we were in St. Columb Major and discovered a wonderful shop called Glanvilles, opposite the Silver Ball. We had been searching for runner-bean seeds and nobody had them, and chanced upon this shop which had packets of just about everything. They also had chunky grow-bags and very happy and healthy-looking tomato plants so we went away with a lot more than we intended. Going back for some bean-poles this week, when we're in the neighbourhood – a magical shop which seems to stock everything and as for the customer care – second to none.

Meanwhile, up at the allotment, the skip is now on site and slowly filling up with rubbish – sadly other people's

Exclusive local wedding and events venue Pengenna Manor near Trelill has announced a very exciting addition to its offering – The Cowyard Barn. This 200-year-old building has been restored and re-purposed to create a gorgeous permanent undercover space for all sorts of parties and events. We and Andy are proudly eating our own asparagus – what a flavour when you've just cut the spears barely half-an-hour ago. Further up the site, Adrian has made wonderful progress with a formerly deserted plot and his strawberry cage is a work of art. Monika and Babs' neat and attractive "back garden" is an example to us all. Mark has been digging hard and erecting a useful shed, so we've all been making use of the warmer, sunnier weather.

In fact, all up and down the site, work is visibly surging ahead and it raises the spirits, even if it destroys the back.

We've still got a couple of vacant plots by the way, so do ask if you would like to see them.



GILL'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

It's a beautiful morning, and thoughts turn to barbecues....

Barbecued Spare Ribs

Ingredients

- 3lbs spare ribs
- 1 tablespoon brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 3 tablespoons tomato ketchup
- \circ 2 tablespoons soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons runny honey
- 1 cup chicken stock

Method

- Thoroughly mix the salt, soy sauce, sugar, ketchup, honey and stock together.
- Mix the spare ribs in the marinade until well coated and leave for at least an hour, longer if possible.
- Either cook on the barbecue, turning from time to time, or in the oven at 180°c for about an hour, turning from time to time.
- Put the spare ribs on a serving dish.

- Dilute the marinade with a little extra stock.
- Either pour over the ribs or serve separately. If more sauce is required double the amount of stock.

Delicious served with a salad and some crusty bread to mop up the sticky sauce.

ANNIVERSARY OF THE FIRST WORLD WAR (LEST WE FORGET)

May for June 1918

From The Parish Magazine

The Reverend H Dalton Jackson writes: "The Pause *Continues.* – To the surprise of many, the pause on the Western Front continues. Germany is said to have her men in shelters ready to spring forth. The weather has been favourable, and yet the attack has not taken place. But the attack is bound to come, and the position throughout the summer will be an anxious one. A cause for general thanksgiving is that the total Allied and neutral shipping losses for April were less than in any month since the "ruthless warfare." A solemn duty rests with us at On the events of the coming weeks the home. future of the war may depend. Let us then have recourse to God in private and public prayer. Special intercessions and prayers will be offered in church every Friday evening at 6.30 p.m. for a speedy and righteous peace to be established, and that an end may be put to the slaughter of the men who are the bulwark and mainstay of our community."

"Prisoners of War. – Humanity revolts at the narratives of returned prisoners of war from German hands. Everyone who has a relative or friend among prisoners is distressed to think that brave men should be treated with such brutality. France has abandoned the argument that to refuse to exchange helps the war. Italy has opened negotiations for exchange, and our Government will do well to anticipate public opinion by taking the necessary steps to secure the return of our soldiers to their homes."

Home Front

On 10th June 1918, the Representation of the People Act 1918 gave the vote to women over 30 years of age. Those between 21 and 30 years of age had to wait until 1928.

Western Front

After advancing to the River Marne, within 56 kilometres of Paris on 3rd June, the Germans experienced supply shortages, fatigue, lack of reserves, and many casualties, along with counter attacks by the newly arrived 2nd US Division and the reinforced French troops. The US Marine Corps won a major battle of Belleau Wood on 4th - 6th June on the banks of the River Aisne; on the first day they lost 1,087 men – more than had been lost in the whole of the Marines' history. "Retreat? Hell, we only just got here." said Captain Lloyd Williams, US Marines. The French were so grateful they renamed the area *Bois de la Brigade de Marine*.

The German advance was halted on 6th June 1918 with some 100,000 casualties. Another German attack on 9th June based on the River Matz, was repulsed by the American and French-led combined Allied forces. The German leadership dithered.

At the first battle of Marne French troops brought 72 pigeon lofts with them as they pushed the Germans back and, despite the troops frequent change of location, all "on-duty" pigeons made it back to their lofts. The lofts could be in unusual places – even London buses were converted to house pigeons. Occasionally, individual pigeons found fame, one being 'Cher Ami', whose message-carrying exploits allowed 194 US troops to be rescued after being stranded behind enemy lines in 1918, a feat that earned the bird the *Croix de Guerre*.

Plonk. We have the troops fighting in France to thank for the word which is now generally used to describe most cheap wine. Encountering French white wine, the British soldier soon substituted the word 'plonk' for 'vin blanc' and English speakers throughout the Commonwealth have been knocking back plonk from wine producing countries over the world ever since.

Mr Mann, said: "I am delighted that the first permanent Post Office mobile service restores vital Post Office services to seven communities in my constituency. The mobile service offers a wide range of services, which will really benefit these rural communities, including banking on behalf of all the major banks."

Postmaster Darren Wills and his team operate the mobile service provide a real lifeline to many Cornish communities.

Last year, Mr Wills, who is a local man and successful publican of The Old Inn & Restaurant St Breward for 18 years, saved his local village shop and Post Office from closing. When the previous Postmaster wanted to retire Mr Wills extended his double garage at the pub to host and relocate the newly built St Breward Stores and Post Office which opened in June 2017.

Mr Wills, said: "People are so delighted with the new Post Office mobile. They feel that it is a real lifesaver to their rural communities. They really appreciate the service."

Sarah Cottrell, Post Office Network Operations Area Manager, said: "Since the closure of Post Office services at these Cornish communities we worked hard to find a solution to enable us to restore services. A Post Office Mobile service is a tried and tested way of maintaining service to smaller communities in other parts of the UK."

A few years ago, when we first moved to Cornwall, a man came to our house to help us with something or other. I offered him a cup of tea, which he accepted, and asked if he would like sugar. "Oh no" he said "I'm Cornish". I couldn't see the connection but then he explained that when the Wesley brothers were preaching in Cornwall in the mid to late 1700's they taught that, since sugar was a product of the slave trade, one shouldn't take sugar. The teaching was accepted and still holds as a tradition today even though Fairtrade sugar is available.

On a beautiful, sunny weekend day, as I watch my infant grandchildren play in the garden, surrounded by spring flowers and birdsong, I wonder what World they will inherit. What have previous generations, and this generation of us in particular, done to alter what our grandchildren can enjoy. Buying locally to support our producers and reduce transport costs and pollution, buying Fairtrade to protect workers, and being "green" in our use of resources, particularly fossil fuels, will all make a contribution to the future for humankind and for the planet.

As we enjoy the beauty of spring in Cornwall and reflect on the wonders of the World that God has given us we might all reflect on how best we can play a part in stewarding that gift.



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

The View from the Allotments

..... and with a very few exceptions, all our plots are flourishing.

Last month I expressed delight and pride that, despite our long and hard winter, we now seemed to be getting the plots under control. We reckon we're about a month behind but plants do catch up quickly and our plots are beginning to look quite acceptable.

We've planted three different sorts of peas – the "normal" Early Onward, a row of Mangetouts and a row of Sugarsnap. Then there are three sorts of beans – runners in two wigwams, green beans in a clever contraption Tony made out of left-over wood-and-net panels and a healthy-looking patch of broad beans, which we love.

In addition to this, we have a patch of courgettes, lots of onions which we're usually very good at, a few potatoes and some tomatoes in the greenhouse. And the parsnip seeds are just beginning to put forth shoots and of course we're eating lots of strawberries from our (sadly neglected but still productive) patch. We've also got several different patches of brassicas already planted out AND there will be a leek patch any day now. So you see, all our depression during the winter was unnecessary, as Nature will always catch up in the end. The only problem is – Nature is also producing a magnificent crop of weeds! In some places the weeds are higher than the crop and we're tackling them as much as we can. But it's hard work, especially if you can't kneel down because of your knees and you can't bend because of your back! I'm exaggerating of course but sometimes it feels that way!

I had some visitors with me recently and took them over the site because they have an allotment back at home. It was good to see how many of our members are also well underway with their own crops. Adam's Great Wall of St. Kew (beans!) is looking very solid and Phil's neat strips of produce (he won the Best-kept Allotment last year) looking enviably efficient. One or two of the plots do need some attention but we're all very good at the site and quick to offer help if needed. So I am guessing that by the time we ask our Judge to come and look over the plots with a view to awarding this year's best-kept plot prize, he will be impressed with our efforts.

Must be off – need to free up another few yards of onions from the WEEDS!

Still got a couple of vacant plots, by the way, so do ask if you would like to see them.



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GILL'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Strawberries and Cream Layer

Ingredients

- 375g all butter pastry
- 4 tbsp icing sugar
- 450g/1 lb ripe strawberries
- 1 vanilla pod or 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 284 ml pot of double cream
- 140 g/ 5oz golden caster sugar

Method

- Heat oven to 220 °C
- Roll the pastry out to a square.
- Lay on a large baking sheet. Place another sheet on top and bake for about 20 minutes until golden brown.
- Heat the grill to high, dust the pastry with icing sugar and carefully caramelise under the grill, repeat again.

- While warm, cut the pastry biscuits into 12 neat rectangles, trimming the edges as you go.
- Halve or guarter the strawberries then dust with a little icing sugar and set aside.
- Split the vanilla pod and scrape the seeds into the cream, then whip lightly with the caster sugar until it holds its shape.
- To assemble, place a blob of cream on each plate and at jaunty angles, stack the biscuits cream and strawberries.



ANNIVERSARY OF THE FIRST WORLD WAR (LEST WE FORGET)

From the Parish Magazine 1918

July

"School Religious Instruction. - The Inspector again visited our Schools, and he was very pleased with the result of his inspection. Mr Taylor also carried away with him an armful of beautiful flowers which the children had brought him. [These flowers must been passed on to the Military Hospital at Devonport because the vicar received the following letter:

"Military Hospital, Devonport,

June 7, 1918.

Dear Sir, - We are most grateful for the very nice flowers, which arrived quite safely this morning. They travelled very well, and are giving so much pleasure in the wards. We are always so glad to have flowers, and the men thoroughly appreciate them.

With many thanks. - Yours truly, C.M., for the Matron."

August

"The Western Front. - The Turning Point. - The wonderful fighting spirit of the allied forces under that splendid leader, General Foch, has put almost everything else in the background. With ever-increasing pride we have read, almost daily, of magnificent spirit of Frenchmen, British, Americans, and Italians, exhibited in this titanic struggle. As General Maurice says, we may regard General Foch's brilliant counter attack, as the turning point in the campaign of 1918. The Germans had crossed the river Marne, and were slowly, but apparently steadily, advancing to Eperuas, happy in the supposition that the French had used up their reserves, and had no troops to attack their lines. Suddenly, without any artillery preparation, General Foch launched an offensive of his own, which has transformed the situation. Taken by surprise, the enemy failed to withstand this assault, and saw the ground he had recently won slipping from his grip. Thousands of prisoners have fallen into the hand of the Allies together with some 400 guns. The first battle of the Marne in 1914 ruined the invader' plans; the second battle of the Marne in 1918 promises to be the opening phase of the final defeat of Germany.

The position of the enemy's masses, packed into a narrow salient of rough country less than twentyfour miles square, with poor communications, and harassed on three sides and from the air, is not enviable. *The U Boats!!* – The Admiralty (British) returns for the month of June shows that the total losses of merchant tonnage from all causes was the smallest recorded for any month since September, 1916. The total for the past quarter of tonnage sunk was 946,578 tons, as compared with 2,236,934 for the quarter ending June, 1917. This is a cause of real thanksgiving, and speaks volumes for the bravery of our sailors in the Navy and Mercantile Service. But for the wonderful spirit of our sailors, it makes one shudder how we might have been on the brink of starvation."

Home Front

It was during a heat-wave, and the Chilwell Ammunition Factory was continuing around the clock. On 1st July 1918, the night shift had just started at 6pm when there was a huge explosion. 134 Nottingham workers were killed and hundreds injured. Many bodies were not found and a mass grave was dug at Attenborough Church. This was the biggest loss of life during a single explosion during World War 1. It was kept a secret at the time. The Inquiry Report was never published.

Western Front

After dithering during June, the German's committed all their remaining troops to an attack, in the Rheims area, against the Allies in what is called the second Battle of the Marne. This battle was fought between 15th July and 7th August. In what was to be the last offensive in the West, the German troops attempted a two-pronged attack across the Marne and advanced as far as Chateau-Thierry. When the Germans began their advance after an initial artillery bombardment, they found that the French had set up a line of false trenches, manned by very few soldiers. The real front line was further back and had been scarcely affected by the bombardment. When the Germans reached the real front line they were decimated by French, British, Italian, and American fire - the Germans were halted. The German thinking now was to withdraw to defensive lines last held in 1917! Petain, the French General, had predicted "If we can hold on until the end of June our situation will be excellent. In July we can resume the offensive, after that victory will be ours."

In July Allied attacks had shown the effectiveness of 'all arms' battle tactics: troops and tanks advancing behind an artillery 'creeping barrage' as groundattacks aircraft swept overhead. At Amiens these were put into operation with great effect from 8 – 11 August. The offensive began with British, Australian, Canadian and French troops attacking east of the city. This effectively was the start of the Allies Hundred Days Offensive. On the first day the Australians met their objectives by early afternoon, taking 8,000 prisoners. The Canadian Corps advanced the furthest: 8 miles. They took 5,000 prisoners. The advance slowed as attackers outreached their heavy artillery support and ran up against troops defending from their 1917 trench positions, but it had given an indication of how the war could be progressed. The Germany declared 8th August as a black day of the German Army; Lieutenant Ernest Rollings, MC, of the 17th Armoured Car Battalion declared "it was by far the best fighting day I have ever had."

By this time, it became clear that Germany was running out of both men and materiel. In Germany, the population was close to starving and industrial unrest was rife with opposition to the Kaiser's government spreading. It was the Allied counter offensives during August and September, planned by the French General Foch, he Allied Commander-in Chief, that would lead Germany to ask for an armistice in November.

The Greatest Medical Holocaust in History – Spanish Flu.

The influenza pandemic of 1918–1919 changed the lives of between 20 and 40 million people around the world.. More died in a single year than were killed in the 4 years of the Black Death 1347–1351. In the Spring of 1918 the disease emerged in pockets across the globe and at first seemed as benign as the common cold. Soldiers in the trenches in France became ill with what was known as *la grippe*.

Although the illness was highly infectious, and the primitive, crowded conditions made rapid spread inevitable, recovery was swift and Doctors at first called it "three-day-fever".

However, it was realised this was no ordinary flu. Glasgow was the first British city to be affected, in May 1918, and within weeks the illness had spread south, reaching London by June. During the next few months 228,000 people died in Britain. Those most at risk were the sick and elderly, and the new illness disproportionately struck those aged 20–30.

The cause of the outbreak is unknown, but the war was most certainly a contributing factor. The war encouraged large-scale movements of people back and forth around the globe, which accelerated the spread of the virus. Also it is thought that the numerous war-ravaged regions of the world experienced poorer nutrition and less sanitary conditions, leaving their population especially susceptible.

At the same time, the spread of the disease directly affected the war itself. All sides lost soldiers to the flu outbreak, but Germany and Austria-Hungary were hit especially hard, with the armies of both countries severely weakened as the Allies were beginning to take the offensive.

The second wave of the disease began in France, Sierra Leone and the United States.

REFLECTIONS

As I write this in June, the African migrants refused permission to land in Italy are coming ashore in Valencia in Spain. Politics being what they are we should not be too surprised either that a new patriotic government in Italy is keen to be seen to be defending its shores against unwelcome visitors nor that an equally new socialist government in Spain is willing to be seen as including the marginalised. But from the point of the view of the rescued it is clear what is preferable, at least in the short term. How do we stand on this issue? Are we prepared to welcome the stranger and the migrant to our shores? Or are we anxious to defend ourselves against unwelcome visitors? Some would see the Brexit vote in these terms.

But is there a Christian perspective on this?

St Paul, writing to the newly converted congregation at Corinth, expresses the view that, for the Christian there is no longer a need to view other human beings "from a human point of view". By this he means that we should no longer see ourselves as in some sort of competition for resources with others or in search of worldly success. Rather we should be able to see each other as God sees us, as equals and all of us equally in need of love. If we put love first, as God requires, then all other considerations fall into place. This is undoubtedly a tall order as we seem to be programmed as humans to seek our own well-being and that of those close to us. But that is why St Paul tells us that we should no longer look with human eyes, "from a human point of view".

This is what Bishop Curry, preaching at the royal wedding, meant by the power of love. Just as love can transform relationships between individuals so that they are willing to put the other's well-being before their own, so love, powered by God, can transform communities so that they, and each member of them, can offer to put others' needs before their own. Wouldn't we wish to live in such a world?

The View from the Allotments and what on earth am I going to enter in the Annual Show???

We're not experts by any means but we have grown vegetables throughout our married life and get a lot of pleasure out of growing and eating our own produce. Even when we had a small and narrow back garden in Ealing, we still had a few vegetables down the bottom and some magnificent tomatoes against a south-facing wall.

We'd never "shown" our veg. though until we lived in St. Kew and it was Burnard Hawken who persuaded us to enter a show back in 2006 (I think), when we were using a small part of his vegetable garden at Lanow. I entered a selection of vegetables on a tray and won second prize! I don't know who beamed more - me or Burnard, when he handed the prize over.

After that there was no stopping us and we have over the years amassed a few firsts, some seconds and thirds and the occasional highly commended each year. Our onions in particular have been amazingly good and last year won a first and a second. Courgettes, too and last year we got a first for our runners – oh, the triumph!

But this year is going to be a bit different, as I can't find enough produce to make a goodly showing.

The long weeks without rain have really taken their toll, despite our faithful watering every day.

I was just reading through the schedule of classes for the show to see what I could put our name down for, and came to the conclusion that there will be very little fit to show on 1 September. The onions are OK and will probably last us through the winter but are much too small to impress, the leeks aren't anywhere near looking like leeks, the courgettes are doing really well but will I have three perfect ones ready on the day and the runner beans are doing all right after a slow start. I'll just have to nurture a few straight ones in the week prior to the Show and keep my fingers crossed. In all, I think we shall be able to show only four items, whereas in the past, we've entered eight or ten classes.

But, hey! What does it matter when we're eating our own beans and courgettes and tomatoes daily and have bags (a few, anyway) of broad beans and peas in the freezer! Looks aren't everything, as my mother used to say!

I'll let you know in the next magazine what, if anything, we won - or you can wander down to the Parish Hall yourselves on Saturday 1 September at 4 pm and find out who managed to beat the heat and win some prizes.

We've still got a couple of vacant plots by the way, so do ask if you would like to see them.

Road incidents near St Kew

On the 31st of July a serious incident involving two vehicles at the turning for St Kew from the A39, one of the vehicles ended up rolling onto its side, emergency services attended the incident including police, fire service and paramedics. The A39 was closed for a couple of hours disrupting many people.

On the same morning another incident occurred on the slip road into St Kew Highway when a car appeared to drive under a trailer connected to a tractor, the car did not seem to have too much damage again the police attended.

On the 1st of August another serious incident occurred just outside the parish when vehicles collided between Bodieve and Little Dinham, the fire services had to free people from the vehicles. Due to the injuries sustained two people were airlifted to Derriford. The road remained closed for many hours.

Hopefully the roads will become a little quieter soon and the number of incidents reduce too.

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



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GILL'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Prawn and Shellfish Rice

A delicious supper for a warm summer evening.

Ingredients

- 12 large unshelled prawns
- 300 400g cleaned fresh mussels, or a mix of mussels and clams
- 1I fish or chicken stock
- 175ml dry white wine
- 5 tbsp olive oil
- 2 banana shallots, diced
- 1 small onion, diced
- 1 small fennel bulb, finely chopped
- sea salt flakes and white pepper
- 1 tsp smoked paprika, or to taste
- bunch of coriander leaves, finely chopped
- finely grated zest & juice of 1 lemon
- 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- 1/2 long red chilli, finely chopped
- 4 ripe plum tomatoes, finely chopped
- 200g short grain rice

Method

- Heat the olive oil in a pan, add the shallots, onion and fennel and cook gently for 10 minutes.
- Season and add the coriander, garlic, lemon zest, chilli and smoked paprika, cook for a few minutes, then stir in the tomatoes.
- Increase the heat to gently caramelise the vegetables.
- Add the rice and cook for a few minutes
- Add the stock and bring to the boil, then simmer until almost cooked. Top up with a splash of water if it gets too dry.
- A few minutes before the rice is cooked add the white wine and tip in the mussels.
- Cover with a lid and shake a few times.
- Cook for three to four minutes, then remove from the heat.
- Discard any unopened shells. Taste the rice and season.
- Add the prawns and cook until they turn pink.
- Stir in a squeeze of lemon juice, a little olive oil and the coriander leaves.
- Serve in shallow bowls with nice crusty bread and a green salad, if liked.

'Definitely need my reading glasses for the small one but I think it is an improvement.'


We will make a final decision on the future format before the end of the year. For now we will print A4 for households and A5 for public areas like shops, pubs and churches.

ANNIVERSARY OF THE FIRST WORLD WAR (LEST WE FORGET)

From the Parish Magazine 1918

September

British Red Cross Society and Order of St. John-Mrs Braddon, Skisdon, Wadebridge, Cornwall. 11th Sept, 1918.

Dear Madam, - The Air Board has decided not to open the hospital under Lady Rachel Byng, for which you so kindly sent up 2 pillow and 4 slips received to-day, so I have taken the liberty of presenting the lot to the British Red Cross Society who are very grateful indeed.

Owing to various causes, the Red Cross are in great need of everything; and I hope you will urge your workers to do all they can towards making pyjamas and operation socks.

Thanking you for all you have done, I am, sincerely,

N.B. – Mrs Braddon wishes to thank those who kindly gave their time and work both at home and in the Institute, and also those who kindly lent their sewing machines. Mrs Braddon will be pleased to give out further work.

Home Front

HMS Glatton, in Dover Harbour, was originally built as a coastal defence ship for the Royal Norwegian Navy but was requisitioned by the Royal Navy. On 16th September 1918, before she had even gone into action, she suffered a large fire in one of her 6-inch magazine and had to be scuttled by torpedoes from nearby destroyers. This was to prevent an explosion in her main magazines which would have blown Dover Naval Base to smithereens. One hundred men of HMS Glatton lost their lives.



Western Front

On 12th September 1918 the First American Army were involved in their first major battle at St Mihiel, and by 16th September had achieved their first victory.

The Battles of the Hindenburg Line



The Hindenburg Line was a German defence position built in France during the winter of 1916-1917. In 1917 the German forces had to retire to his line, but the Line was broken in September 1918 during the Allied Forces Hundred Days Offensive. The September battles included: 12th – Battle

of Harrincourt, which also involved a New Zealand Division; 18th - Epehy, which included an Australian Corps; 27th September to 1st October – Canal du Nord, included 3 Canadian Divisions and a New Zealand Division; 29th September to 2nd October – St Quentin Canal, included 3 Australian Division and 2 American Divisions. *To be continued*.

The Greatest Medical Holocaust in History – Spanish Flu - Conclusion

The second wave of the disease began in France, Sierra Leone and the United States. The virus had mutated into a much deadlier form than the first wave. This has been attributed to the circumstances of the First World War. Soldiers with a mild strain stayed where they were, while the severely ill were sent on crowded trains to crowded field hospitals, spreading the deadlier virus. The second wave began and the flu spread quickly around the world again. Most of those who survived the first wave were now immune so it must have been the same strain of flu. Now the most vulnerable people were those like soldiers in the trenches, young and healthy adults.

An estimated 10-20% of those who were infected died. With about a third of the world population infected, this means 3-6% of the entire global population died. As many as 17 million died in India, about 5% of the population. In Japan, 23 million people were affected, and 390,000 died. In Samoa, in November and December 1918, 20% of the population of 38,000 died. In the USA about 28% of the population suffered, and 500,000-675,000 died. In Britain, as many as 250,000 died, and in France, more than 400,000. Every continent suffered. Many of those who survived had lifelong health problems.

Snippets

A visiting General asked a young cavalry officer mounted on a forlorn-looking horse 'Where did you get your Military Cross?' 'Borrowed it for the occasion', replied the young officer nervously, to the horror of everyone present. However, there were smiles all round when a staff officer explained that the young officer thought that the General had asked him 'Where did you get your miserable horse?'

During the Great War ladies were asked to collect and save hair when they combed their pet dogs, and then take it to their nearest hospital. This hair was needed to provide soft chest coverings for badly wounded soldiers who could not wear pyjamas.

Many of you attended the evening service held on 4th August 2014, when the "lights went out over Europe" and we were then at war with Germany and the First World War started.

7.00 pm - The Last Post

We don't have a bugler yet; however, a CD is available for our evening service.

7.00 pm - Beacon of Light

Beacons will be lighted throughout the countries.

7.05 pm - Ringing Out for Peace

Our church Bell Ringers have agreed to ring at this time.

7.05 pm - A Cry for Peace

In Cornwall only the Bodmin and Newquay Town Criers are registered.

There will be the usual Remembrance Service at St James in the morning at 10.30am. The evening service will start at 6.45pm so as to include the Last Post, Bell Ringing, and Bagpipes.

It is hoped that as many people as possible will join in the Battle's Over events to mark the conclusion of the first World War and pay tribute to those who played their part.



Our Feathered Friends

August a time for our garden birds to relax and enjoy the weather? Not so, as eager pale plumaged fledglings demand to be fed food into noisy hungry mouths. A lot of people don't start feeding birds until the autumn through to winter, however parent birds take advantage of gardeners who put out fat balls, different types of seed and mealworms. This helps birds to conserve energy in seeking out extra food for themselves. Please remember to provide clean water too.

Overhead, acrobatic swallows feed up, putting on weight for their September & October journeys back to Africa. Look out for flocks on wires near your home gathering together ready for the off.

The 'Clutts' garden which backs onto fields has been host to a large number of house sparrows. A count of over 45 were feeding on seed put down for a pair of very tame pheasants throughout August. Very encouraging as this is a species in decline.

Bird counts in our garden throughout August & September have included 5 dunnock, 9 blue tit, 7 collared doves with a single greenfinch and smaller numbers of chaffinch, great tit and robin (feeding 2 young), a great spotted woodpecker and flock of 40 goldfinch feeding on seed heads.

It's a good idea to list the maximum number of each species weekly whatever garden you have or even wasteland or parks. By doing so you gather comparison counts that can be useful to the BTO or RSPB. It's fun too. How does your garden compare? Autumn migration movement through the Parish is well under way, swifts have long gone but rarer birds on migration can turn up anywhere, indeed even in your garden, such as black redstarts, and small warblers.

Last September we enjoyed seeing a wryneck briefly, with 3 firecrest, and a spotted flycatcher all in one morning - all grounded thanks to the sea mist.

Finally, into October & November our starling flocks will be swelled by thousands arriving from northern Europe for the winter. How many of you have visited the starling murmuration at Roughtor? Thousands of starlings create a swirling mass of patterns in the sky during the winter, or wondered at the huge noisy flock in flight over your garden in the morning and again in the evening? Winter thrushes will also be arriving from northern Europe, both redwings and fieldfares.

Listen out at night when the clocks go back for the 'tsweep' noise of migrating redwings, or the 'chack-chack' call of fieldfares during the day.

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

The View from the Allotments

..... and after my dire prognostications, we did actually get a few sustificates!

In the end, I decided to bite the bullet and enter six classes at the show, if only to support local efforts, and we were rewarded with a few of the coveted certificates.

I had a first for my bouquet of herbs (but since it was the only one in the class, I can't really boast about that!!), seconds for our beeyootiful runner beans and deep red apples, a third for our lovely little yellow courgettes and a highly commended for my pen-and-ink sketch of trees at Blisland (though here again, there were only four entries so I came fourth anyway!!)

My only disappointment was with my lovely red onions. Last year I got a first and a second for the onions and this year nuffink! I don't know what went wrong. I still think they looked beautiful but maybe I took too many outer leaves off or something esoteric like that. Never mind – they taste fantastic, so who cares?

What we're looking forward to now are the corncobs. The plants have done better than ever before and are simply laden with cobs. About a month ago, when our grand-daughters were with us, the wind was very strong one day and half the stand of corn went over to a seriously dangerous angle. I spent two hours with bamboo canes, propping each plant up individually and it has certainly rewarded me for the effort. I have opened up a couple of cobs and they look pretty much ready to me so we are going to try some at the weekend.

We are slightly disappointed with our "other" runner beans this year – the ones with white flowers which cover Tony's patent wire edifice. There have been masses of flowers, covered with masses of bees but very few beans. Perhaps we covered the edifice too densely and all the veg. will be found on the inside when we finally take it down! But it's very attractive to look at so again, who cares!!

We have lifted all the onions now and laid them up against the shed. So of course it's raining now, isn't it and I shall have to bring them home to dry out here in the back greenhouse. Not such a prolific crop as last year, but very tasty. Actually I had to throw quite a few away back in April or so, as they had gone soft and nasty. Perhaps with fewer onions, we shan't have any leftovers next Spring.

We had the first parsnips at the weekend and though they look good and went well roasted with a good beef joint, they were a bit lacking in flavour. My father always said they needed the first frost to make them taste good. Not that I'm hoping for cold weather, you understand!



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



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MIKE'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Provencal-style chicken

A delicious quick and easy supper dish, perfect for an early Autumn evening. Serves 4.

Ingredients

- 4 large or 8 small chicken thighs (bone in, skin on).
- 1 large onion, cut lengthways into 8 segments.
- 4 medium tomatoes, quartered.
- 2 garlic cloves, finely sliced.
- o 1 medium-sized courgette, cut in half lengthwavs and then into 2 cm chunks.
- o 1 red pepper, sliced lengthways into 8 segments.
- A good handful of pitted green olives.
- 200ml dry white wine (or chicken stock if preferred).
- 2 10cm sprigs of rosemary.
- 1 tsp herbes de Provence or dried mixed herbs.
- Sea salt & black pepper.
- 30g butter, plus a little more for greasing. Ο
- 1 tbsp olive oil. Ο
- Small handful of parsley, roughly chopped.

Method

• Pre-heat the oven to 180 °c, and butter a large rectangular oven-proof dish - large enough hold the chicken thighs and vegetables in one layer.

- Brown the chicken thighs all over in batches in a frying pan with the olive oil, and transfer to the oven dish skin side up, pouring any pan juices over the top.
- Tuck all the vegetables around and in between the chicken thighs, along with the olives, garlic and rosemary sprigs.
- Sprinkle over the dried herbs and season well.
- Pour over the wine (or stock if using).
- Bake uncovered in the oven for around 30-40 minutes, or until the chicken is thoroughly cooked through and the juices run clear.
- Remove the chicken pieces to a warmed plate, and carefully transfer the vegetables to a warmed dish with a slotted spoon, discarding the rosemary. Strain the cooking juices into a saucepan and boil rapidly to reduce by about half. Stir in the butter and adjust the seasoning if needed.
- o Return the vegetables to the cooking dish, place the chicken thighs on top, pour over the thickened sauce and sprinkle with the parsley.

Serve with steamed green beans, and some crusty bread or creamy mashed potato to mop up the juices.







ANNIVERSARY OF THE FIRST WORLD WAR (LEST WE FORGET)

From the Parish Magazine

October

'War Notes'

Palestine. – The wonderful good news from the several seats of war has taken precedence over everything. The dramatic events in Palestine and Macedonia have completely changed the complexion of the war in these districts. The Turks have been broken up, and over 60,000 prisoners taken, with hundreds of guns. Palestine is delivered from the Turks, and is now under Christian rule.

Bulgaria. – The Franco-Serbians have gained a notable success. They have broken the resistance of the Bulgarians, having cut off their line of retreat, and have taken thousands of prisoners, and advanced on a wide front into the enemy's country. All the allied contingents seem to have fought superbly; but the Serbians, nerved by patriotism and righteous anger at their oppressors, have shown a superhuman courage.

On the Western Front. – There has been heavy fighting all along the Hindenburg Line. The British and French troops have occupied one after another of the Hindenburg defences, which the Germans considered impregnable. Soon we hope to hear of the whole of this line to have been broken. How long after the Germans may hold out is not of course known; but already the war tone of the Germans is changing – dramatic events are happening there, and it is quite possible a 'real' peace offer may come from Germany before Christmas.

The Coming Pinch. – With the approach of the Fifth War Winter we may have to suffer some of the privations already experienced by all the continental belligerents. We shall have less meat, and must pay more. But the great shortage will be in fuel and the products of fuel, light. Our coal supplies are almost unable to bear the strain placed upon them. This is due to the needs of our allies, and the shorthandedness of our mines. We shall have to economise every minute of light and every pound of coal. This shortage of coal and paraffin may need the altering of the hour of evening service. It has been suggested that evensong be held in the afternoon instead of the evening. However, this will not be done without first consulting the question at a public meeting.

British Red Cross Society and Order of St.John. Mrs Braddon, Skisdon, Wadebridge, Cornwall. 11th September, 1918.

Dear Madam, - The Air Board has decided not to open the hospital under Lady Rachel Byng, for which you so kindly sent up 2 pillow and 4 slips received to-day, so I have taken the liberty of presenting the lot to the British Red Cross Society who are very grateful indeed.

Owing to various causes, the Red Cross are in great need of everything; and I hope you will urge your workers to do all they can towards making pyjamas and operation socks.

Thanking you for all you have done, I am, sincerely, MARY MORSE, J.P. M.A., Hon. Sec.

N.B. – Mrs Braddon wishes to thank those who kindly gave their time and work both at home and in the Institute, and also those who kindly lent their sewing machines. Mrs Braddon will be pleased to give out further work.

During October 1918, two soldiers with St Kew connections lost their lives. They are remembered on the St Kew War Memorial.

Francis Lewis Lyle died on 16 October 1918 as a result of wounds as a prisoner-of-war. He was a Private in the 7th Battalion of The Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry (DCLI). 7 DCLI were involved in the Acheville and Fresnoy areas in France during the period September-October 1918 when many soldiers were taken prisoner. Frances Lewis Lyle was born at Week St Mary in 1896; his parents Lewis and Rhoda (formerly Littlejohns) lived at St Teath and later at Trebarn, St Kew. Before enlisting, Francis worked at Bokelly as a farmhand. His father Lewis died at Tregildrens, St Kew in 1941, and Francis's brother died in 1945; both are buried at Trelill Cemetery. Francis Lewis Lyle is buried in Grave 10 at the Sarralbe Military Cemetery, close to the German border.



Reginald Thomas Carhart, a Private of 2/4 Battalion DCLI (Territorial Force) died on 29 October 1918 from non-battle illness and is buried at the Delhi War Cemetery. He was born in 1898 at Egloshayle to cattleman Marcina Carhart and St Kew-born Mary. He had an older sister Florrie and younger brothers



Harold Edward and Frederick Charles, both born at St Kew. The role of his unit was to reinforce 1/4 DCLI also in India who provided troops for France (via the UK), and to carry out duties in India garrisons so Indian troops could be deployed to France. The unit Roll of Honour includes 54 soldiers all of whom succumbed to disease whilst in India.

7.00 pm - Beacon of Light

Beacons will be lighted throughout the countries.

7.05 pm - Ringing Out for Peace

Our church Bell Ringers have agreed to ring at this time.

7.05 pm - A Cry for Peace

In Cornwall only the Bodmin and Newquay Town Criers are registered.

There will be the usual Remembrance Service at St James in the morning at 10.30am. The evening service will start at 6.45pm so as to include the Last Post, Bell Ringing, and Bagpipes.

It is hoped that as many people as possible will join in the Battle's Over events to mark the conclusion of the first World War and pay tribute to those who played their part.

The National Health Service is 70 years old this year.

I was born as the NHS was being debated and about to come into being, and worked in it for 37 years.

Whilst it is far from perfect for many reasons, we should not forget what was happening before it came about. My predecessor in general practice saw the changes first hand. He had 3 types of patients in the practice all treated in a different way! The private patients had priority both in time given to them and in appointments. Then there were the 'panel' patients - from back in the days of Lloyd George certain companies' workers and families were able to access a doctor paid for by the employers. He was the Post Office doctor and saw many postmen bitten by dogs amongst all the usual illnesses. Then there were those who could not pay.... Most family doctors (like solicitors of old) worked 'pro bono' offering free time to those less well-off in their community. Pre-1934 they looked after those in the workhouse as well.

1948 changed all that. All were to be treated equally and free at the point of access. There were no new hospitals, no extra doctors or nurses, just a radical change of organisation. It came about after many years of discussion and we should thank Beveridge and the like for their passion for looking after the needs of all, not just a privileged few.

The NHS appeared at a time when Britain saw health care as crucial to one of the "five giants" that Beveridge declared should be slain during post-war reconstruction - want, disease, squalor, ignorance, idleness. The cataclysm of war provided an opportunity that might not have been taken in quieter times. It was just one of five post war problems that the NHS addressed, 70 years on we could question how we are dealing with the other 4. They are not new problems. The bible has almost 3,000 verses dealing with poverty and injustice and how they should be overcome, of God's heart for the poor and oppressed, about want and squalor, for healing. It is there in nearly every page. You can even buy a bible (The Poverty and Justice Bible) with them all highlighted in modern English.

So, 70 years of the NHS - rejoice and celebrate. Not perfect but way better than what was happening before. But it is only a start, Beveridge had ideas on the other 4 giants as well. God and the bible have a few ideas too!

Present: Chairman J. Lethbridge, Cllrs T. Mott, P. Bishop and four members of the public. Apologies were received from Cllrs J. Rickard, A. Godden, R. Godden, B. Finnemore and County Councillor S. Knightley.

Mr Chapman spoke to the Parish Council about his outline plans for a possible small housing development in Pendoggett, incorporating affordable housing. He has already had preparatory discussions with Cornwall Council planning officers and wished to brief the Parish Council on his intentions.

Following recently completed resurfacing work on the road near St Kew School, it was agreed to write a letter of thanks as these were rarely received by Cormac, the contractor involved.

The Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) and how it should be spent was discussed following a request from Cornwall Association of Local Councils. It was agreed that there could be a division of these monies between all parishes and towns in Cornwall on a per capita basis, to be spent on capital projects for their communities.

Some slate kerb stones at Chapel Amble have been damaged as the result of cars parking too close to the junction and impeding traffic flow and agricultural vehicle access. It was agreed to discuss this in more detail at a later Parish Council meeting, possibly together with a site visit in order to investigate possible solutions to the problem.

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A new local business - Cornish Rock Gin



Cornish Rock Gin is the latest in the boom of new small-scale gin distillers popping up across the UK.

Husband and wife George and Angie moved into their new home (nestled in woodlands just outside our parish) just over a year ago. While the house was being renovated they spent a lot of time walking Blue, their white Alsatian, at Rock. On the beach they met Mark and Carole from nearby St Tudy. They became friends and over drinks in the local pub the idea for making gin started.

"We have our own borehole water source in the property, which we had to open up to supply the house, so we thought we could use this to make our favourite drink" explains Angie. "It was loose talk to make gin at home" says Mark and George. "It was a bit of fun, just for ourselves to drink on a summer's day in the garden."

Using their own spring water to make gin changed from idea to reality when Angie started looking into what was involved in making gin, sparking a new passion. "I didn't really know much about making gin, but I liked drinking good quality gin!" says Angie, so she began training at gin schools, including the Ginstitute in London. The first 50-odd sample batches were taste-tested by friends, family, gin experts and, of course, themselves. Only once the recipe had been perfected did they start to produce Rock Gin, bottling in small batches and individually numbering each bottle.

Their enthusiasm soon took on a new dimension with a decision to up-scale. "Making it becomes a bit more technical, buying the alcohol and doing everything wasn't simple, but we thought we would make 500 bottles and see what happened! At worst, we would drink it ourselves over a long time." laughs Angie.

What helped them go from home-made for fun to a new business start-up was a visit from Mark Harris from The Growth Hub. Mark saw they had the right attitude and the right formula and encouraged the three friends to look at their cottage industry as a business

"Mark coming to see us really set us going and encouraged us do it more professionally. He introduced us to Paul from South West Manufacturing Advisory Service and that's when we considered buying our own kit. After the visit, we decided to buy the machinery, set it up and build a distillery here at the house" explains George. They made a grant application and were successful, receiving 50% funding from SWMAS to develop the business. As a result they now have their own still (named 'Bonanza Boy' after George and Angie's favourite race horse - every still has to have a unique name) installed in an outbuilding.

George, Angie and Mark are proud of the fact that their gin is a bit different to the mass market brands. Most are distilled and bottled in 24 hours while Cornish Rock is matured for 30 days before bottling, creating a smooth, fresh taste. According to George its character is best appreciated in a large stemmed gin glass with plenty of ice, a quality tonic and garnished with a twist of orange or grapefruit peel.

Production is already up to 500 bottles a week, sold through a large number of shops, pubs and restaurants in North and South Cornwall. The business doesn't stand still however - they have already perfected a new pink gin which has just been released.

This business has a real family feel, with their passion for drinking gin in the summer sun coming through in every glass.

Locally, Rock Gin is now sold at The Red Lion, St Kew Highway; St Kew Inn, St Kew; The Cornish Arms Pendoggett; Wadebridge Wines and The Little Gin Shack in Wadebridge.







11.00 am 11th November 2018

The centenary of the Armistice that finally brought an end to the fighting of the First World War.

For all of us who have only ever known 'peace' (a relative term of course) it is hard to imagine how the human race could wage war on such an industrial scale that it resulted in the deaths of anywhere between 15 and 19 million people, with countless millions more injured. The prevailing mood in November 1918 was 'never again' but, as we know, human conflict has continued to be a feature of life ever since with large-and small-scale wars around the globe right up to the present day. It seems we never learn the lessons of history and continue to allow political, religious and ethnic tensions to escalate out of control. Unfortunately, with modern high-tech. warfare, most of the victims are not military personnel. They are innocent, ordinary people living innocent, ordinary lives.

Although 11th November is a significant anniversary, it is also a day when we should remember everyone affected by conflict, and spend some time reflecting on the reasons for such conflicts. Now more than ever the world needs governments who turn away from conflict and join together to negotiate settlement of disputes rationally and peacefully. Unfortunately that seems to be increasingly unlikely as narrow self-interest is becoming the norm.

Finally, on behalf of the Editorial Team and all our readers, I'd like to thank William Garland for his 'Lest We Forget' column. Meticulously researched and well written, it is an insight into the horrors of the first truly modern war, a view of the impact on local communities, and a fitting tribute to the fallen from our villages.

Our Feathered Friends

Does anybody give a hoot about our native owls? A lot of us do, as we have grown up reading about the wise old Owl, as the Tawny Owl is often referred to in children's books and cartoons.

Wise cannot be said of the ghost-like Barn Owl often a casualty of our roads and lanes due to being hit by vehicles while flying low and at night. The British Trust for Ornithology are encouraging us to report sightings and sounds of Owls in autumn and winter.

Tawny Owls have a piercing 'keewick' call, as well as the familiar hoot, as they try to attract a mate. We have five resident species - Tawny Owl, Barn Owl, short- and long-eared Owls and the smaller Little Owl. The latter is a fairly rare bird in Cornwall, originally introduced from continental Europe. I will concentrate on our two main 'parish' resident owls the Tawny Owl and Barn Owl.

In Pendoggett we usually hear Tawny Owls calling around end of January through to March, and again in the Autumn. They prefer broad-leaf woodlands and large rural gardens, calling for a mate usually prior to moving through if there is no response. Last February I came face to face with a Tawny in our garden tree. It set the security lights ablaze as it stared at me from the tree It is a compact owl, with rufus and grey-brown plumage and large, dark eyes. I had another encounter on the river walk in Camelford, this time a single owl being mobbed by a Blackbird forcing it to move into thick ivy to get some peace. It is worth looking around if you hear bird alarm calls as you walk down a lane or through

woodland. Tawny Owls can sometimes call in daylight - confusing the listener as they are nocturnal in nature, hence heard more than seen!

The Barn Owl is a lovely owl to stumble across in our parish and beyond. We are lucky to find these owls from early evening through into the night. It is a very agile, pale owl sometimes seen floating along the verges and hedgerows picked out in the glow of our car headlights. The main road from Delabole towards Camelford is a good spot to see them, as is the road towards St Kew Inn and the Port Isaac Road. I have also seen a Barn Owl in the arched window of the old Chapel near St Kew Golf Club.

The Barn Owl can sometimes be seen hunting voles and mice in daylight - if the weather has been poor its soft wings can become waterlogged forcing it out in daylight to get enough food. We had a regular visitor in Pendoggett in the field backing on to our garden a few years ago. Sadly farm water troughs and horse buckets containing water can be a death trap to Barn Owls. The Barn Owl Trust are raising awareness of this, showing how to make simple floats to counteract this issue. Their web site www.barnowltrust.org.uk has the details. So, watch and listen out for the Tawny and Barn Owls in and around our parish. Happy Owling!

CHILDREN'S CORNER

I made this Play Dough recipe for my grandchildren recently. It's great fun to make, and play with!

Ingredients

- 150g plain flour
- 2 tbsp of vegetable oil
- 75g salt
- 2 tbsp cream of tartar
- 240ml to 360ml of boiling water (add slowly until it feels right)
- gel food colouring
- glycerine (optional but it does make it more stretchy and shiny!)

Method

- Mix the flour, salt, cream of tartar and oil in a large mixing bowl.
- Add the food colouring to the boiling water and then pour the water into the dry ingredients.
- Keep stirring until it becomes sticky and starts to come together.
- Add the glycerine if using.
- Allow the dough to cool and then take it out of the bowl and knead it for a few minutes until it isn't sticky any more. This is very important, so keep going until it feels nice and elastic.

Have fun making shapes with biscuit cutters, if you have them, or just different sized cups. Make faces and holes with a pencil or biro. The possibilities are endless!

North Cornwall Book Festival St. Endellion 2018

Neil Ansell: 'The Last Wilderness a Journey into Silence' (Tinder Press - £9.99)

The Festival is growing in strength every year, it certainly was the day I went to collect my ticket for Neil Ansell's talk on the Saturday lunchtime. The place was full of local primary school-children (160 - I was reliably informed) all present to take part in imaginative writing workshops. The noise was deafening!

I wanted to listen Neil Ansell as a couple of years ago I had picked up his book '**Deep Country - Five Years in the Welsh Hills'**, and thoroughly enjoyed it. His writing resonates with me as he has a deep love of both the natural world and personal solitude. Both of these concepts are essential for our own well-being: without them we are impoverished.

Neil was interviewed by Lisa Cooper (a local author in her own right) and audience members in the beautifully decorated (Egyptian storks and papyrus) marquee of the Festival. Apart from the breeze springing up and enlivening the tent, there was no rain and the whole event was soundly appreciated by all.

Neil has had a very adventurous life, from hitchhiking across the Sahara to being an undercover Houl



investigative journalist for the BBC, but it is the love of landscape and wild life that is the basis of his whole being.

His most recent book, **'The Last Wilderness'**, recounts his four solitary journeys to the far north-west of Scotland - arguably the wildest place our heavily populated islands can provide.

These journeys have allowed him to regain his sense of solitude from when he was younger. He is a single father of almost adult daughters living in Brighton at present. Scotland has also allowed him to begin to come to terms with his failing health - he has a serious heart condition and increasing deafness. However, these are not going to stop his solitary hill-walking as glimpses of wild animals, such as pine martens, in their natural habitat are all-important to him. He says that he has still not achieved his ambition of seeing a Scottish wildcat, although he has seen them in Africa.

What he was at pains to convey to us was that the natural world is not there for us to abuse and exploit. We are visitors to it and must treat it gently if we as a species are to survive. This is an attitude I wholly endorse and I was very pleased that I was able to thank him personally for his talk and his wonderful book about the Welsh hills.

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

The View from the Allotments

..... and it's all a bit of an anti-climax, now that autumn has arrived with 'orrible weather and we can't even get to the allotment to tidy it up a bit

We had a week's holiday at the end of September/beginning of October and since we've been back we've not actually done any real work on the plot. We've harvested the last of the runners and courgettes and have been picking and stripping the corn-cobs (best we've ever grown – must be a result of the long weeks of sunshine). We also had the first leeks with Sunday dinner last week, and Tony has made a magnificent pumpkin soup with one of our Queensland Blues. He does it with chicken stock, our own onions, potatoes and a couple of spoonfuls of curry powder. Very good indeed and we have enough left over for another dose this weekend.

The onions, by the way, are all in and actually not such a poor crop as I had expected. I put them in the back greenhouse here at the house to dry off, then hung them in nets in the garage. They will certainly last us until spring and are just as tasty as usual, only smaller.

One of the things we're engaged in at the moment (when the gales and rain permit) is to dismantle the various wigwams and pea-frames which have been holding up our crops. The allotment starts to look a bit bare, but it does give us the space to put some manure on and turn over some of the patches.

Towards the end of August an independent judge came onto the site to inspect the plots and award our "Best-kept Allotment" prizes. We don't look for immaculate patches but rather evidence that the plot has been, is and will be productive. We also look for as wide a variety as possible of fruit and vegetables, with indications also of what will be used throughout the winter and on into Spring. So it's not beauty but productivity we were looking for and the results were as follows:

Call the Doula

My birth package includes birth preparation during pregnancy, an on-call period from 38-42 weeks and support after your baby is born. 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GILL'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Apple, Plum and Blackberry Cobbler

A proper autumn pudding!

Ingredients

- 800g less than perfect apples, peeled, cored and cubed
- 4tbsp apple juice
- 350g plums, halved and stoned
- 100g light brown muscovado sugar
- 225g blackberries
- 200g plain flour, sifted
- 1 tsp baking powder
- o 50g butter
- 50g ground almonds
- 170ml soured cream
- 1 free range egg, beaten
- 25-50g flaked almonds 0
- 25g demerara sugar

Method

- Pre-heat the oven to 180c.
- Place the apples and apple juice in a pan and bring to the boil. Cover and simmer for 5 minutes.

- Add the plums and simmer for a further 8-10 minutes until the fruit is just softened.
- Remove from the heat and stir in the muscovado sugar and the blackberries.
- Transfer the mixture to an oven-proof dish.
- Place the flour, ground almonds and baking powder into a bowl and using fingertips, rub in the butter until the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs.
- Stir in the soured cream and the beaten egg.
- Place spoonfuls of the scone mixture over the filling leaving little gaps.
- Mix together the flaked almonds and demerara sugar and scatter over the scone mixture.
- Bake for 35-40 minutes until the topping is well risen and golden.
- Remove from oven and leave to stand for 5 minutes.
- Serve with lovely Cornish cream, custard or ice cream.

ANNIVERSARY OF THE FIRST WORLD WAR (LEST WE FORGET)

From the Parish Magazine

December

" '*Thanks be to God.'-* The terrible war is over, and our first duty is to thank God, the many Giver of Victory, who has saved us from many and great dangers, and has given us complete victory. When we remember what this war has cost us, we bow our heads in gratitude to the dead who saved for mankind ordered liberty and the right to freedom. We honour the living who have fought to the end, and we look to the future with confidence born of experience of the goodness of God and of His Presence with those who strive to do His will. In that spirit we go forward fearlessly and hopefully.

Thanksgiving Sunday, November 17th. – On this date the whole nation gave thanks to God for our great deliverance and the glorious victory. We in St. Kew, also, remembered to return thanks to Almighty God, with special prayers, hymns, and sermons, and joyful peal of bells. The prevailing sickness, and the cold weather, prevented many from coming; but it was gratifying to find so large a number assembled at Holy Communion and at the evening service.

At all the services the Vicar read the list of our honoured dead; and at the Holy Eucharist we pleaded, specially, for God's saving grace to give rest to their souls, and peace of mind to their bereaved ones.

* William Penalligon's family was living at Pendoggett when he died. Although his mother was St Kew born, his father was from Wadebridge. He is not mentioned on the St Kew War Memorial but is remembered in the Parish Church of St Breocke, and on the War Memorials at Egloshayle and Coronation Park, Wadebridge.

This entry concludes the trawl of Parish Magazines from the 1914-1918 period.

THE ARMISTICE

An armistice is not a surrender or a truce, but a mutual agreement to cease fighting as a mechanism to negotiate a lasting peace. There have been many armistices through history but that of 1918 is the most significant, giving rise to the observance of Armistice Day on 11 November in many countries. The build up to the situation whereby all nations involved in this world war came to a negotiating table has been described in earlier articles in The Parish Magazine. Over 3 days: 7–10 November 1918, the two major powers discussed terms, amounting to a complete dismantlement of German war-making capability. With no negotiating room, the German delegation finally signed at 0510 hours on 11 November 1918. Hostilities ended at 1100 Technically, the Armistice lasted a month, hours. but was extended twice for two further months, then for a year until peace was ratified at 1615 hours on 10 January 1920.



The US President had proposed his 'Fourteen Points' in January 1918 as a way of justifying America's involvement in the war and ensuring future peace. Summarised they were: Open diplomacy with no secret treaties, Freedom of navigation at sea, Free trade, Disarmament where possible, Improved rights of colonies, Occupation of Russia to end, Occupation of Belgium to end, France to be liberated and Alsace-Lorraine given back, Italy's borders to be readjusted, Austro-Hungarian Empire people's to be free, Occupation of Romania, Serbia and Montenegro to end, Countries in the Ottoman Empire to be free, Poland to be independent, An Association of nations to be set up.

Despite a short, difficult growing season; a cold spell in late spring followed by a hot, dry summer, the gardeners of St Kew did themselves proud. Practically every class of vegetables was represented, apart from leeks which were noticeable by their absence. The displays of tomatoes and apples were second to none.

Flowers were not so well represented. This could be reflect the difficult growing season or the fact that a serious rethink is needed for the flower classes. Any suggestions to improve these classes would be most gratefully received.

The produce and cookery classes were as well supported as ever with many delicious-looking items on show. A huge range of jams and chutneys were exhibited, but no honey this year. Hopefully somebody can remedy this next year.

Jim Godden presented the prizes for us and it was good to see several cups going to new faces. My overriding memories of the show include the size and quality of the displays and the pleasing number of new exhibitors or exhibitors returning after a short break.

Thanks to all those who supported us and we look forward to seeing you all again next year.

brothers in one family and, like a loving parent, he doesn't impose his will on us. He allows us freely to choose how we react and respond to each other, especially when we feel we've been badly treated, offended or injured.

So, when we bewail, as we often do, the number of conflicts and acts of terrorism in our world today, let each of us take a moment to think about our own situation; our neighbours, our community and yes, our church congregations and ask ourselves: 'Am I living in peace and harmony within them?' 'Am I quick to take offence?' 'Am I still holding a grudge against someone many years after an incident?' 'Am I still seething with resentment at someone who did me harm and hoping they'll get their come-uppance one day?'

Think of the meaning of 're-membering' and let this year's blood-red poppies be more than a poignant symbol of remembrance of those who died. Let them also be a means of bringing us together, of inspiring us to let go of present anger and old resentments and bitterness, truly to forgive and to be at peace with one another. And, because this is something we really find hard to do, let's determine to ask God to give us the grace we need to enable us to do it.

The Parish Council meets in the Parish Hall, St Kew Churchtown at 7.00pm on the second Tuesday of each month. Members of the public are welcome to attend and address the meeting on any subject of concern.

St Kew Parish Council Meeting held on Tuesday 9th October 2018 at 7.00 pm in the Parish hall.

Present: Chairman A Godden, Cllrs T Mott, J Rowe, J Rickard, B Finnemore and 4 members of the public.

The matter of the erosion of the road by the stream in St Kew Churchtown was raised again. It was reported that the Clerk had written to County Highways again, with a copy to the ward member Steve Knightly and the local MP Scott Mann, but apart from acknowledgement from Scott Mann's office she had not heard anything further.

A letter from Crantock PC revealed that they are taking Cornwall Council to a Judicial Review over the way they have disregarded the neighbourhood plan and approved 22 houses. A further letter on the subject of Cornwall Council ignoring Neighbourhood Plans was received from the North Cornwall Cluster Group.

Road Closure

Prior notice was received of the road closure of Trelill Road to St Kew Highway on the 12th to the 16th of November.

Chapel Amble

Parking around the junction and the kerb stone at Chapel Amble was raised. The Clerk is to write to Mr Hambley for a date for completion of repairs to the kerb stone. The parking seem not to be a major problem and that enforcing a yellow line ban would be difficult. It was decided to monitor the situation for the time being.

Speeding at Pendoggett

Councillor Lethbridge had been approached by the licensee of the Cornish Arms at Pendoggett regarding the speed of traffic past the Inn and asked if speed

cameras could be installed to control the traffic. After investigation it was found that the matter has to be instigated by the Cornwall Councillor first for it to proceed. It was agreed to put this on next month's agenda.

Planning Applications

PA18/08313 - Mr Hawkey, Penpont Farm, Chapel Amble. New livestock housing with covered feed passage. **Recommend approval.**

PA18/08531 - Mr Paul Frost, Rumbletums, Trelill Road. Demolition of existing fish and chip shop and erection of a detached dwelling. The meeting was adjourned to allow representations from the applicant and neighbour. Issues were raised regarding the party wall and that the councillors had visited the site. It was agreed that a full site meeting would be held the next evening. At the site meeting the councillors looked at the site and the implications of the proposal in depth. It was agreed to recommend refusal of the application on grounds that the proposal over developed the site, leaving 200mm one side and 750mm the other side against the boundary walls. The proposed dwelling was also too high in relation the the surrounding properties. The finish of the proposed dwelling would not be in keeping with the streetscape, and parking would mean vehicles backing out onto a busy road.

Starlings

Dear Clutts! Loved your article in the October magazine. I have a note on the calendar that the Starlings arrived last year on the 25th October. I wrote the following article for the magazine some years ago:

Brave little birds, they fly hundreds of miles to get here - I was once told some come from as far away as the Steppes of Russia. One would wonder why they bother to migrate as they spend a very good winter here each year. Why don't they stay for the summer? But I gather they have been doing this journey for hundreds of years.

We at St Kew and Kenwyn Park have our own group of about 35 starlings, perhaps a family group. They arrive on cue in October and take up residence in Jean Plater's tree doing her snow white pillow cases no good at all. Jean is not best pleased but feeds them nevertheless, as do a number of us. However I digress.

In early March we were visited by or landed on by about 200 starlings. They usually pass over between 4 and 5pm. This evening they landed and perched on an ash tree at the side of our house. The noise of their twittering was incredible. I stood with my mouth open hoping they had not come to tea or had decided to roost here for a change. As I said, the noise they made was deafening. Suddenly about six of them flew up a couple of feet above the tree and then, just as suddenly, there was absolute silence. Not a single twitter!

These six birds fluttered over the tops of the branches for perhaps a quarter of a minute perhaps less. Complete silence reigned from the 200 or so sitting on the branches. These sentinels then landed back onto the tree and the horrendous chorus of twittering resumed.

This amazing phenomenon happened twice more and then - the noise stopped. Absolute silence but this time no bird had moved. This quiet lasted maybe 20 seconds. Then, as though somebody had said "Jump!" every single bird rose up into the air. How they managed to miss the chap above I'll never know but they each became part of this huge 'bubble' of birds. They flew up into the air and did a circle of our house and garden. Some one must have shouted "Follow me!" and they flew away towards the Allen Valley.

Had something scared them that evening on their flight to their roost or was this a training exercise for their flight home? Who knows? Anybody got any answers?

At that time nobody had any answers. Have you?



As you reported at the time about six birds that fluttered over the top of the rest of the flock who remained silent until they re-joined. I cannot find any reason for this behaviour either, which is why ornithology is a hobby that we all constantly learn from. My personal thoughts: perhaps these were elder stalwarts that the others learn from and follow assessing the risks or perhaps wind direction prior to the flock taking flight. The silence after constant twittering and chattering may have enabled the six birds to assess the situation by sound as well as sight so as not to distract them as they looked for potential danger? Starlings are intelligent birds and roost together for warmth and safety, with a pecking order too.

Thanks Betty, but apologies - we will continue to seek the answer!

Our Feathered Friends

Who killed cock robin? Probably cock robin! The robin redbreast, Britain's national bird. This cheeky plump little bird is a firm favourite, unless you're a fellow robin! The robin is our most recognised song bird, neat and compact with thin bill, a rusty red bib and face contrasting with paler underparts, a beady eye and a warm brown back and tail. Both females and males are alike. Robins sing most of the year - a lovely trilling song advertising its presence for potential mate in the spring as well as a warning of 'keep out' to repel other males. Robins also have a distinct hard *tick*-like warning call which can become more rapid.

Once territory is established, the male and female's sole purpose is to sing to defend their realm, giving them the best opportunity to breed. Robins are quite sociable birds to us humans, gaining confidence alongside gardeners, and often feeding on easy pickings or regular visits to garden bird tables. They also perch on garden tools or flower pots waiting patiently. Robins enjoy gardens, but are also found in woodland, parks and the edges of forests. Garden visits tend to increase during cold weather as the birds seek out food.

The robin is a very ruthless, nasty and aggressive defender of its territory. Robins tend to peck or claw and flap their wings at intruders. Fighting birds attempt to see off the other with breasts puffed out in warning prior to striking each other. This can even be to the death, hence the shock introduction to our favourite bird!

Throughout this year I have noted that the robin has adapted its feeding habits and can be seen acting like a blue tit hanging from the fat ball feeders instead of using the bird table or on the ground as they are supposed to do! Sparrows, rooks and jackdaws are game too.

Last winter's harsh weather brought in three robins. They tolerated each other (well almost), until the third robin came too close and we then witnessed it being chased off.

Robins look for mating partners between December and March, the female chasing after the male. Lucky male! Last May we had young robins in the garden, three being fed They are comical - it's a robin gone wrong, with brown spotted feathers and the red breast not really established.

Christmas greetings - the robin comes into its own with its association with Christmas Cards and decorations at this time of year. Victorians loved Christmas cards and the robin adorned many a card. It is said that it depicts the Postman at the time who wore red coats and were nicknamed robins or red breasts. Everyone loves a Christmas card, a warm cheer of greeting at winter time.



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
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

The View from the Allotments

..... but I have to admit that it's a pretty shabby view at the moment. It's difficult to reconcile just how productive the plots are with how shabby and unkempt they are looking at the moment – ours, that is, not everybody's! Some of our neighbours put us to shame as they have already turned everything over, strimmed the paths, dug in our (free) manure and generally weeded the place within an inch of it's life, whereas our two strips are a mass of weeds.

Earlier on I did take down the bean wigwams and cut down all the corn stalks, which started to make the place look loved and tended. But then, what with the weather and visitors and time, I seem to have neglected things a bit. But, and it is a very big BUT, these neglected plots are giving us masses of produce for ourselves and for others.


I walk round to the "lotty" about three or four times a week and come back with leeks, parsnips, cavolo nero, kale and brussels sprouts. Up until a week or so ago, I was also lifting some 'new' potatoes – I had bought some seed potatoes with a view to having them at Christmas but they produced much more quickly and we have really enjoyed them. I think I mentioned in an earlier newsletter that our sweetcorn have been magnificent this year and I have several pairs wrapped up in the freezer – I don't blanch them or anything but just wrap them in clingfilm in twos and put them away. In the old days, I used to boil them up, four at a time in large saucepans and you could barely see across the kitchen for steam! But it's not necessary, so I don't do it. Same with broad beans, runners and peas – I just chop them and put them in plastic bags. Runners lose their crispness a bit but are fine for stews and casseroles.

Talking of cooking, I was speaking to a fellow tenant and comparing recipes for pumpkin and squash and things and she tells me she mixes parsnip with potato for a really delicately flavoured mash. We often mash swede and carrot together which is also good and Tony has been experimenting with our wonderful Queensland Blue pumpkins to produce a rich and creamy soup. He uses our own onions, own potatoes, lots of pumpkin flesh, chicken stock from the last roast carcass and a spoon of curry powder to liven it up. Even if you don't have your own pumpkins or squashes to hand, it's worth a try with a "boughten" one. Delicious.

Well, writing these notes have made me feel guilty enough to take advantage of the dry weather and go round and put in an hour or so on the weeds. Maybe next month I can give myself a pat on the back and tell you all that the place is looking neat and tidy again! Maybe!

We've still got a couple of vacancies which we'd love to fill, so please give me a ring if you would like to come over and have a look. We have just welcomed a new plot-holder but would love to see a couple more for the new year.

GILL'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Hot Citrus Pudding in its own juices

Ingredients

- 3 oz/75g softened butter
- 3 medium eggs separated
- 6 oz/175g caster sugar
- 3 oz/75g self-raising flour
- Grated zest and juice of 1 orange and 1 lemon
- Grated zest and juice of 2 limes
- 7 fl oz/200ml milk

Method

- Pre-heat the oven to gas mark 4, 180° c.
- Whisk the butter and sugar together until pale in colour. It wont go light and fluffy because there is more sugar than butter.
- Beat the egg yolks and whisk them into the mixture.
- Sift the flour and lightly fold into the mixture alternating it with the combined citrus juices, zest and lastly the milk. Don't worry if it looks a little curdled at this stage.
- Pour the mixture into a greased deep baking dish.

 Bake on the middle shelf of the pre-heated oven for 50 minutes, by which time the top should be golden brown in colour.

Lovely served with clotted cream or ice cream.

Although this pudding is served hot, it is just as nice cold, if it lasts that long!

ANNIVERSARY OF THE FIRST WORLD WAR (LEST WE FORGET)

November for December 1918

Home Front



The General Election of 1918 was the first to be held after the Representation of the People Act had been passed earlier in the year, which gave women over thirty the right to vote. Polling was held on 14 December, although the count did not begin until 28 December. The reason for the four-

teen day gap was to allow soldiers and sailors still serving overseas to vote.

The close of war brought with it many new aspects of social life. Servicemen were seeking work and there was assistance through various organisations such as: The Officers' Association, Comrades of the Great War, and the National Federation of Discharged and Demobilised Sailors and Soldiers. These organisations became amalgamated under the name The British Legion, which still exists today.

The Bible Society

When war broke out on 4 August 1914 every member of the British Armed Forces received a New Testament as a standard part of his kit – uniform, gun, boots, Bible. The Bible Society was among several organisations that worked tirelessly to provide copies of the scriptures for soldiers, sailors, airman, prisoners-of-war, conscientious objectors, and those invalided out of the front line. Over the 4 years of the war, the Bible Society printed and distributed some 9 million Bibles in 80 different languages. "Soldiers are happy to have something sacred with them in the hope it might stop bullets." said Dr Snape. "It also connected soldiers with their loved ones emotionally and devotionally as they may have agreed to read the same texts. It was hugely consoling for individual soldiers."

Random

Immediately the news of the Armistice became known, the Executive of the Licensed Victuallers Association met and recommended in the interest of good order and seemly conduct, that the sales of spirits should be suspended throughout the day, and not to open in the evening. This happened without significant incidents. Over 2 billion letters and cards were delivered in Britain by the Post Office. The demands on the service saw the end of the 'Penny Post' set up in 1840, as the price of a single letter was raised to $1\frac{1}{2}$ pence.



The War - "It was unprecedented in its intensity and violence, its human and material cost, and its global scale. It extinguished three empires, re-drew the maps of three continents, and brought

about Bolshevik and German superpowerdom and – depending on whom you listen to – sowed the seeds of fascism, appeasement, another world war, and a Cold War as well." Source: Hidden Shores of the 1st World War by Jackie Storer (British Library).

The Parish Council meets in the Parish Hall. St Kew Churchtown at 7.00pm on the second Tuesday of each month. Members of the public are welcome to attend and address the meeting on any subject of concern.

St Kew Parish Council Meeting held on Tuesday 13th November 2018 at 7.00 pm in the Parish hall.

Present: Chairman J Lethbridge, Cllrs A Godden, T Mott, J Rowe, R Godden, J Rickard, B Finnemore Cornwall Councillor S Knightly and 10 members of the public.

The speeding traffic through Pendoggett was raised again. The Council are looking into the installation of speed cameras, this would be very costly and the local landlord had offered to contribute towards the cost.

The uneven platform at the top of the steps by St Kew Church is still a concern. The Council had written to the church over the condition of the stones on the platform and requested a meeting, but no reply was forthcoming. The clerk was requested to write again.

Councillor Stephen Knightly reported that the Bridge Surgery and the Camel Estuary Practice are to merge into one building on the site of the bus park in Southern Way. The reason for this was thought to be so that they could offer a greater range of services. The Council was assured that this would not effect St Kew Highway surgery in any way.

St Kew does not have a neighbourhood plan. The Council has always thought that the cost and effort required was not worth the benefits gained. Recently it has been shown that the planning officials can and do ignore the plan and approve developments, contrary to neighbourhood plans, on what they class a

"Rural exception sites". Councillor Knightly said that this was not the case and they do take into account the plan. The majority of the Council still felt that St Kew would gain little from such a plan.
